1 AN ACT concerning

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Criminal Law - Death Penalty - Repeal

3 FOR the purpose of repealing the death penalty; repealing procedures and 4 requirements related to the death penalty; providing that in certain cases in 5 which the State has filed a notice to seek a sentence of death, the notice shall be 6 considered withdrawn and it shall be considered a notice to seek a sentence of 7 life imprisonment without the possibility of parole under certain circumstances; providing that certain persons serving life sentences are not eligible persons for 8 9 Patuxent Institution under certain circumstances; altering the circumstance concerning parole for persons serving life sentences when the State sought a 10 certain penalty; providing that it is the intent of the General Assembly that 11 12 certain services shall be funded by savings resulting from the repeal of the death penalty; requiring the Governor's Office of Crime Control and Prevention 13 to submit a certain report to certain committees; requiring that certain funds be 14 15 administered by the Governor's Office of Crime Control and Prevention; making conforming and clarifying changes; and generally relating to the repeal of the 16 17 death penalty.

1 2 3	WHEREAS, The Maryland Commission on Capital Punishment was created by Chapter 431 of the Acts of 2008 for the purpose of studying all aspects of capital punishment as currently and historically administered in the State; and
4 5 6	WHEREAS, The Commission comprised 23 appointees representing a broad diversity of views on capital punishment, as well as the racial, ethnic, gender, and geographic diversity of the State; and
7 8 9	WHEREAS, The Commission held five public hearings at which testimony from experts and members of the public was presented and discussed, as well as five additional meetings to discuss the evidence presented at the hearings and written submissions; and
11 12 13 14 15	WHEREAS, The Commission issued its final report to the General Assembly on December 12, 2008, which included the Commission's strong recommendation that, to eliminate racial and jurisdictional bias, reduce unnecessary costs, lessen the misery that capital cases force victims of family members to endure, and eliminate the risk that an innocent person can be convicted, capital punishment be abolished in Maryland; now, therefore,
