2	States Senator shall be held:

- 3 (1) in 1998 and every sixth year thereafter; and
- 4 (2) in 2000 and every sixth year thereafter.

- 6 (a) (1) If there is a vacancy in the office of United States Senator, the Governor shall appoint an eligible individual to fill the vacancy.
- 8 (2) [Except as provided in paragraph (3) of this subsection, the] **THE** 9 appointed individual shall serve until a successor is elected pursuant to subsection (b) of this section to fill the remainder of the term.
- 11 [(3)] (B) (1) The appointed individual shall serve [for the 12 remainder of the term] UNTIL A SUCCESSOR IS ELECTED TO COMPLETE THE TERM 13 AS PROVIDED IN THIS SUBSECTION.
- (2) [if] IF the vacancy occurs [after the date that is 21 days] before the deadline for filing certificates of candidacy for the election that is held in the [fourth year of the term] SECOND YEAR OF THE TERM, THE SUCCESSOR TO COMPLETE THE REMAINDER OF THE TERM SHALL BE ELECTED AT THE REGULAR STATEWIDE GENERAL ELECTION HELD IN THE SECOND YEAR OF THE TERM.
- (3) If the vacancy occurs after the filing deadline for certificates of candidacy for the election that is held in the second year of the term, but before the deadline for filing certificates of candidacy for the election that is held in the fourth year of the term, the successor to complete the remainder of the term shall be elected at the regular statewide general election held in the fourth year of the term.
 - (4) IF THE VACANCY OCCURS AFTER THE FILING DEADLINE FOR CERTIFICATES OF CANDIDACY FOR THE ELECTION THAT IS HELD IN THE FOURTH YEAR OF THE TERM, THE INDIVIDUAL APPOINTED BY THE GOVERNOR SHALL COMPLETE THAT TERM AND THE SUCCESSOR SHALL BE ELECTED AT THE NEXT REGULAR STATEWIDE GENERAL ELECTION AND COMMENCE THE NEXT TERM OF OFFICE FOR UNITED STATES SENATOR.
 - [(b) If the vacancy occurs before the date that is 21 days before the deadline for filing certificates of candidacy for the next succeeding regular statewide election, the Governor shall issue a proclamation immediately after the occurrence of the

- 2 be held at the same time as the next regular statewide primary election and regular
- 3 statewide general election.]
- 4 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect
