A BILL ENTITLED

1 AN ACT concerning

2 **Health Occupations – Morticians and Funeral Directors – Crematory License**

3 FOR the purpose of repealing an exemption for a crematory from the scope of the
4 Maryland Morticians and Funeral Directors Act; requiring one member of the
5 State Board of Morticians and Funeral Directors to be an owner or operator of a
6 crematory; authorizing the Board to inspect the records, premises, equipment,
7 and physical operations of licensed funeral establishments and licensed
8 crematories; prohibiting an individual or certain entities from establishing,
9 owning, or operating a crematory in the State on or after a certain date unless
10 the crematory is licensed; requiring an applicant for a crematory license to
11 submit a certain application to the Board; requiring an applicant for a
12 crematory license to pay a certain fee; requiring that the application for a
13 crematory license include certain information; prohibiting a licensed crematory
14 from being required to pay funds into the Family Security Trust Fund;
15 requiring an inspection of a crematory to be unannounced; authorizing an
16 unannounced inspection of a crematory to include advance notice under certain
17 circumstances; defining certain terms; and generally relating to morticians,
18 funeral directors, and crematories.

6 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF
7 MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

8 **Article – Health Occupations**

9 7–101.

10 (a) In this title the following words have the meanings indicated.

11 (b) “Apprentice” means an individual licensed by the Board who assists a
12 licensed mortician or funeral director in the practice of mortuary science or funeral
13 direction, under direct supervision of a licensed mortician or funeral director.

14 (c) “Apprentice sponsor” means a person who:

15 (1) Is a licensed mortician or funeral director practicing mortuary
16 science as a licensed mortician or funeral director in Maryland at least 1 year
17 immediately prior to accepting the applicant as an apprentice; and

18 (2) Provides direct supervision to an apprentice.

19 **(D) “AUTHORIZING AGENT” MEANS A PERSON LEGALLY ENTITLED TO**
20 **ORDER THE CREMATION OF HUMAN REMAINS OR LEGALLY AUTHORIZED TO**
21 **CONTROL THE FINAL DISPOSITION OF HUMAN REMAINS.**

22 **[(d)] (E)** “Board” means the Maryland State Board of Morticians and
23 Funeral Directors.

24 **[(e)] (F)** (1) “Corporation” means a mortuary science business whose
25 articles of incorporation are in good standing with the Maryland State Department of
26 Assessments and Taxation, or its successor, the initial business for which the license is
27 issued must have been incorporated on or before June 1, 1945 and have
28 “Incorporated”, “Inc.”, or “Corporation” in its name.

29 (2) “Corporation” does not include, for purposes of issuing a
30 corporation license, a “professional association” (P.A.) or a “professional corporation”
31 (P.C.).

32 **[(f)] (G)** “Courtesy card” means a license issued by the Board to licensed
33 practitioners of mortuary science in other states, to make a removal of a dead human
34 body in this State and to return the body to another state or country, to return dead

1 bodies from another state or country to this State, to fill out the family history portion
2 of the death certificate, and to sign the death certificate in the holder's capacity as a
3 licensed practitioner of mortuary science.

4 **(H) "CREMATION" MEANS THE PROCESS OF REDUCING HUMAN**
5 **REMAINS TO BONE FRAGMENTS THROUGH INTENSE HEAT AND EVAPORATION,**
6 **WHICH MAY INCLUDE ANY MECHANICAL OR THERMAL PROCESS.**

7 **(I) "CREMATORY" MEANS A STRUCTURE THAT HAS OR CONTAINS**
8 **CREMATION EQUIPMENT WHERE AN INDIVIDUAL, SOLE PROPRIETORSHIP,**
9 **PARTNERSHIP, PROFESSIONAL ASSOCIATION, OR CORPORATION PROVIDES**
10 **CREMATION SERVICES AND THAT CHARGES A FEE FOR THE CREMATION OF**
11 **HUMAN REMAINS.**

12 **(J) "CREMATORY LICENSE" MEANS A LICENSE ISSUED BY THE BOARD**
13 **TO ALLOW A SOLE PROPRIETORSHIP, PARTNERSHIP, PROFESSIONAL**
14 **ASSOCIATION, OR CORPORATION TO OPERATE A CREMATORY BUSINESS**
15 **THROUGH WHICH A LICENSEE MAY ENGAGE IN THE OPERATION OF A**
16 **CREMATORY.**

17 **(K) "FINAL DISPOSITION" MEANS THE CREMATION, BURIAL, OR OTHER**
18 **FINAL DISPOSITION OF HUMAN REMAINS.**

19 [(g)] (L) "Funeral director" means an individual who is licensed by the
20 Board to practice all aspects of mortuary science except for embalming.

21 [(h)] (M) "Funeral establishment" means any building, structure, or
22 premises from which the business of practicing mortuary science is conducted.

23 **(N) "HUMAN REMAINS" MEANS THE DEAD BODY OF A DECEASED HUMAN**
24 **INDIVIDUAL, OR PART OF A BODY OR LIMB THAT HAS BEEN REMOVED FROM A**
25 **LIVING INDIVIDUAL, INCLUDING THE BODY, PART OF A BODY, OR LIMB IN ANY**
26 **STATE OF DECOMPOSITION.**

27 [(i)] (O) (1) "License" means, unless the context requires otherwise, a
28 license issued by the Board.

29 (2) "License" includes, unless otherwise indicated:

30 (i) A mortician license;

31 (ii) An apprentice license;

32 (iii) A funeral director license;

- 1 (iv) A surviving spouse license;
- 2 (v) A corporation license;
- 3 (vi) A funeral establishment license; [and]
- 4 (vii) A courtesy card; **AND**

5 **(VIII) A CREMATORY LICENSE.**

6 [(j)] (P) “Licensed apprentice” means, unless the context requires
7 otherwise, an apprentice who is licensed by the Board to assist a licensed mortician or
8 funeral director in the practice of mortuary science or funeral direction.

9 (Q) **“LICENSED CREMATORY” MEANS A CREMATORY LICENSED BY THE**
10 **BOARD.**

11 [(k)] (R) “Licensed funeral director” means, unless the context requires
12 otherwise, a funeral director who is licensed by the Board to practice funeral direction.

13 [(l)] (S) “Licensed funeral establishment” means, unless the context
14 requires otherwise, a funeral establishment that is licensed by the Board.

15 [(m)] (T) “Licensed mortician” means, unless the context requires otherwise,
16 a mortician who is licensed by the Board under this title to practice mortuary science.

17 [(n)] (U) “Licensee” means an individual or entity licensed by the Board to
18 practice mortuary science to the extent determined by the Board.

19 [(o)] (V) “Mortician” means an individual who practices mortuary science.

20 [(p)] (W) (1) “Practice funeral direction” means:

21 (i) To operate a funeral establishment;

22 (ii) For compensation, to prepare a dead human body for
23 disposition; or

24 (iii) For compensation, to arrange for or make final disposition of
25 a dead human body.

26 (2) “Practice funeral direction” does not include, for compensation,
27 disinfecting or preserving a dead human body or any of its parts by arterial or cavity
28 injection or any other type of preservation.

29 [(q)] (X) (1) “Practice mortuary science” means:

- 1 (i) To operate a funeral establishment;
- 2 (ii) For compensation, to prepare a dead human body for
3 disposition; or
- 4 (iii) For compensation, to arrange for or make final disposition of
5 a dead human body.

6 (2) "Practice mortuary science" includes:

- 7 (i) The practice of funeral direction; and
- 8 (ii) Disinfecting or preserving a dead human body or any of its
9 parts by arterial or cavity injection.

10 (3) "Practice mortuary science" does not include the pickup, removal,
11 or transportation of a dead human body, if the unlicensed individual is acting under
12 the direction of a licensed mortician or funeral director.

13 [(r)] (Y) "Pre-need contract" means an agreement between a consumer and
14 a licensed funeral director, licensed mortician, or surviving spouse to provide any
15 goods and services purchased prior to the time of death. Goods and services shall
16 include:

17 (1) A service, including any form of preservation and disposition, that
18 a mortician normally provides in the ordinary course of business; or

19 (2) Merchandise, including a casket, vault, or clothing, that a
20 mortician normally provides in the ordinary course of business.

21 [(s)] (Z) "Surviving spouse" means the legal widow or widower of a licensed
22 funeral director or licensed mortician, whose license was in good standing at the time
23 of death, and who at the time of death, wholly or partly owned and operated a
24 mortuary science business.

25 7-102.

26 (a) This title does not limit the right of an individual to practice a health
27 occupation that the individual is authorized to practice under this article.

28 (b) This title does not apply to the business of operating a cemetery [or
29 crematory], including the sale of cemetery lots, grave sites, mausoleums, monuments,
30 lawn crypts, or vaults.

31 7-201.

32 There is a State Board of Morticians and Funeral Directors in the Department.

1 7-202.

2 (a) (1) The Board consists of 11 members.

3 (2) Of the 11 Board members:

4 (i) 6 shall be licensed morticians or licensed funeral directors,
5 **ONE OF WHOM SHALL BE AN OWNER OR OPERATOR OF A CREMATORY;** and

6 (ii) 5 shall be consumer members.

7 (3) All Board members shall be residents of the State.

8 (4) The Governor shall appoint each member with the advice of the
9 Secretary, and with the advice and consent of the Senate.

10 (5) The Board may not have more than one member who is employed
11 by or affiliated with, directly or indirectly, the same corporation, professional
12 association, or other entity, that owns, directly or through a subsidiary corporation,
13 professional association, or other entity, one or more funeral homes.

14 7-205.

15 (a) In addition to the powers and duties set forth elsewhere in this title, the
16 Board has the following powers and duties:

17 (1) To adopt bylaws, rules, and regulations to carry out the provisions
18 of this title;

19 (2) To adopt a seal;

20 (3) To establish procedures for licensing apprentices;

21 (4) To keep a list of all individuals currently licensed by the Board;

22 (5) To investigate any alleged violation of this title;

23 (6) To enforce this title;

24 (7) To adopt rules and regulations regarding false and misleading
25 advertising and misrepresentation;

26 (8) To inspect **THE RECORDS, PREMISES, EQUIPMENT, AND**
27 **PHYSICAL OPERATIONS OF** licensed funeral establishments **AND LICENSED**
28 **CREMATORIES;**

1 (9) On receipt of a written and signed complaint, including a referral
2 from the Commissioner of Labor and Industry, to conduct an unannounced inspection
3 of the funeral establishment to determine compliance at that funeral establishment
4 with the Centers for Disease Control's guidelines on universal precautions;

5 (10) To establish standards for the practice of mortuary science; and

6 (11) To establish standards for sanitation and waste disposal in
7 connection with the practice of mortuary science.

8 (b) The Board may conduct an audit of a licensee that:

9 (1) Receives pre-need funds;

10 (2) Places pre-need funds in a trust; or

11 (3) Enters into a pre-need contract.

12 7-406.

13 A licensee shall maintain a complete file of a cremation that includes the
14 signature of the next of kin, person identifying the body, or person responsible for
15 disposition, time of death, and the date and time of cremation.

16 **7-406.1.**

17 **(A) ON OR AFTER NOVEMBER 30, 2010, AN INDIVIDUAL, SOLE**
18 **PROPRIETORSHIP, PARTNERSHIP, PROFESSIONAL ASSOCIATION, OR**
19 **CORPORATION MAY NOT ESTABLISH, OWN, OR OPERATE A CREMATORY IN THE**
20 **STATE UNLESS THE CREMATORY IS LICENSED UNDER THIS TITLE.**

21 **(B) TO APPLY FOR A CREMATORY LICENSE, AN APPLICANT SHALL:**

22 **(1) SUBMIT TO THE BOARD AN APPLICATION ON THE FORM**
23 **PROVIDED BY THE BOARD; AND**

24 **(2) PAY TO THE BOARD A NONREFUNDABLE BIENNIAL**
25 **LICENSURE FEE OF:**

26 **(I) \$250 IF THE CREMATORY IS IN OR ON THE IMMEDIATE**
27 **PREMISES OF A LICENSED FUNERAL ESTABLISHMENT; OR**

28 **(II) \$350 IF THE CREMATORY IS NOT IN OR ON THE**
29 **IMMEDIATE PREMISES OF A LICENSED FUNERAL ESTABLISHMENT.**

30 **(C) THE APPLICATION FOR A CREMATORY LICENSE SHALL STATE:**

1 (1) **THE NAME AND FIXED STREET ADDRESS OF THE CREMATORY;**
2 **AND**

3 (2) **ANY OTHER REASONABLE INFORMATION THAT THE BOARD**
4 **DETERMINES IS NECESSARY TO CARRY OUT THIS TITLE.**

5 (D) **A CREMATORY MAY NOT BE REQUIRED TO CONTRIBUTE ANY FUNDS**
6 **TO THE FAMILY SECURITY TRUST FUND.**

7 7-409.

8 (a) All inspections of funeral establishments **AND CREMATORIES** shall be
9 unannounced and may take place at any time without notice from the Board.

10 (b) An unannounced inspection may include advance notice that an
11 investigator may be in the region of the funeral establishment **OR CREMATORY**, if:

12 (1) The advance notice is no more than 14 days prior to the inspection;

13 (2) No specific date or time is provided for the inspection; and

14 (3) The advance notice is provided solely to ensure that a licensed
15 mortician [or], funeral director, **OR THE OWNER OR OPERATOR OF A CREMATORY**
16 will be on-site for the inspection.

17 7-410.

18 (a) Any individual who is 18 years of age or older may decide the disposition
19 of the individual's own body after the individual's death without the pre-death or
20 post-death consent of another person by executing a document that expresses the
21 individual's wishes or by entering into a pre-need contract.

22 (b) In order to be valid, any document executed under subsection (a) of this
23 section must be written and signed by the individual in the presence of a witness, who,
24 in turn, shall sign the document in the presence of the individual.

25 (c) Unless a person has knowledge that contrary directions have been given
26 by the decedent, if a decedent has not executed a document under subsection (a) of this
27 section, the following persons, in the order of priority stated, have the right to arrange
28 for the final disposition of the body of the decedent under this section and are liable for
29 the reasonable costs of preparation, care, and disposition of the decedent:

30 (1) The surviving spouse or domestic partner, as defined in § 1-101 of
31 the Health – General Article, of the decedent;

32 (2) An adult child of the decedent;

1 (3) A parent of the decedent;

2 (4) An adult brother or sister of the decedent;

3 (5) A person acting as a representative of the decedent under a signed
4 authorization of the decedent;

5 (6) The guardian of the person of the decedent at the time of the
6 decedent's death, if a guardian has been appointed; or

7 (7) In the absence of any person under paragraphs (1) through (6) of
8 this subsection, any other person willing to assume the responsibility to act as the
9 authorizing agent for purposes of arranging the final disposition of the decedent's
10 body, including the personal representative of the decedent's estate, after attesting in
11 writing that a good faith effort has been made to no avail to contact the persons
12 described in paragraphs (1) through (6) of this subsection.

13 (d) (1) Subject to paragraph (2) of this subsection, if a decedent has more
14 than one survivor under subsection (c)(1) through (4) of this section, any adult child,
15 parent, or adult brother or sister of the decedent who confirms in writing to a licensee
16 that all of the other members of the same class have been notified may serve as the
17 authorizing agent unless the licensee receives a written objection from another
18 member of that class.

19 (2) If a decedent has more than one survivor under subsection (c)(1)
20 through (4) of this section, the majority of a class may serve as the authorizing agent.

21 (e) For an individual whose final disposition is the responsibility of the State
22 or any of its instrumentalities, a public administrator, medical examiner, coroner,
23 State-appointed guardian, or any other public official charged with arranging the final
24 disposition of the body of the individual may serve as the authorizing agent for
25 purposes of this section.

26 (f) For an individual who has donated the individual's body to medical
27 science or whose death occurred in a nursing home or other private institution, a
28 representative of the institution to which the body was donated or in which the
29 decedent died may serve as the authorizing agent of the decedent and the institution
30 is charged with making arrangements for the final disposition of the body.

31 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect
32 October 1, 2009.
