1 AN ACT concerning

2 Health Occupations - Morticians and Funeral Directors - Crematory License

FOR the purpose of repealing an exemption for a crematory from the scope of the 3 Maryland Morticians and Funeral Directors Act; requiring one member altering 4 5 the membership of the State Board of Morticians and Funeral Directors to be an 6 owner or operator of a crematory; authorizing the Board to inspect the records, 7 equipment, and physical operations of licensed 8 establishments and licensed crematories; prohibiting an individual or certain 9 entities from establishing, owning, or operating a crematory in the State on or after a certain date unless the crematory is licensed; requiring an applicant for 10 a crematory license to submit a certain application to the Board; requiring an 11 applicant for a crematory license to pay a certain fee; requiring that the 12 application for a crematory license include certain information; prohibiting a 13 licensed crematory from being required to pay funds into the Family Security 14 Trust Fund; requiring an inspection of a crematory to be unannounced; 15 authorizing an unannounced inspection of a crematory to include advance notice 16 under certain circumstances; defining certain terms; and generally relating to 17 morticians, funeral directors, and crematories. 18

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- [(f)] (G) "Courtesy card" means a license issued by the Board to licensed practitioners of mortuary science in other states, to make a removal of a dead human body in this State and to return the body to another state or country, to return dead bodies from another state or country to this State, to fill out the family history portion of the death certificate, and to sign the death certificate in the holder's capacity as a licensed practitioner of mortuary science.
- 10 (H) "CREMATION" MEANS THE PROCESS OF REDUCING HUMAN 11 REMAINS TO BONE FRAGMENTS THROUGH INTENSE HEAT AND EVAPORATION, 12 WHICH MAY INCLUDE ANY MECHANICAL OR THERMAL PROCESS.
- 13 (I) "CREMATORY" MEANS A STRUCTURE THAT HAS OR CONTAINS
 14 CREMATION EQUIPMENT WHERE AN INDIVIDUAL, SOLE PROPRIETORSHIP,
 15 PARTNERSHIP, PROFESSIONAL ASSOCIATION, OR CORPORATION PROVIDES
 16 CREMATION SERVICES AND THAT CHARGES A FEE FOR THE CREMATION OF
 17 HUMAN REMAINS.
- 18 (J) "CREMATORY LICENSE" MEANS A LICENSE ISSUED BY THE BOARD 19 TO ALLOW A SOLE PROPRIETORSHIP, PARTNERSHIP, PROFESSIONAL 20 ASSOCIATION, OR CORPORATION TO OPERATE A CREMATORY BUSINESS 21 THROUGH WHICH A LICENSEE MAY ENGAGE IN THE OPERATION OF A 22 CREMATORY.
- 23 (K) "FINAL DISPOSITION" MEANS THE CREMATION, BURIAL, OR OTHER 24 FINAL DISPOSITION OF HUMAN REMAINS.
- [(g)] (L) "Funeral director" means an individual who is licensed by the Board to practice all aspects of mortuary science except for embalming.
- [(h)] (M) "Funeral establishment" means any building, structure, or premises from which the business of practicing mortuary science is conducted.

27 28	(a) Any individual who is 18 years of age or older may decide the disposition of the individual's own body after the individual's death without the pre-death or

post-death consent of another person by executing a document that expresses the

individual's wishes or by entering into a pre-need contract.

- (b) In order to be valid, any document executed under subsection (a) of this section must be written and signed by the individual in the presence of a witness, who, in turn, shall sign the document in the presence of the individual.
 - (c) Unless a person has knowledge that contrary directions have been given by the decedent, if a decedent has not executed a document under subsection (a) of this section, the following persons, in the order of priority stated, have the right to arrange for the final disposition of the body of the decedent under this section and are liable for the reasonable costs of preparation, care, and disposition of the decedent:
- 9 (1) The surviving spouse or domestic partner, as defined in § 1–101 of the Health General Article, of the decedent;
- 11 (2) An adult child of the decedent;
- 12 (3) A parent of the decedent;

- 13 (4) An adult brother or sister of the decedent;
- 14 (5) A person acting as a representative of the decedent under a signed authorization of the decedent;
- 16 (6) The guardian of the person of the decedent at the time of the 17 decedent's death, if a guardian has been appointed; or
 - (7) In the absence of any person under paragraphs (1) through (6) of this subsection, any other person willing to assume the responsibility to act as the authorizing agent for purposes of arranging the final disposition of the decedent's body, including the personal representative of the decedent's estate, after attesting in writing that a good faith effort has been made to no avail to contact the persons described in paragraphs (1) through (6) of this subsection.
 - (d) (1) Subject to paragraph (2) of this subsection, if a decedent has more than one survivor under subsection (c)(1) through (4) of this section, any adult child, parent, or adult brother or sister of the decedent who confirms in writing to a licensee that all of the other members of the same class have been notified may serve as the authorizing agent unless the licensee receives a written objection from another member of that class.
 - (2) If a decedent has more than one survivor under subsection (c)(1) through (4) of this section, the majority of a class may serve as the authorizing agent.
 - (e) For an individual whose final disposition is the responsibility of the State or any of its instrumentalities, a public administrator, medical examiner, coroner, State—appointed guardian, or any other public official charged with arranging the final disposition of the body of the individual may serve as the authorizing agent for purposes of this section.
