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## SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION

1 A Senate Joint Resolution concerning

2	Federal Legislation to Ban Color Additives
3 4 5	FOR the purpose of urging the United States Congress to enact legislation that bans the use of certain color additives in food sold, served, or distributed in the United States.
6 7 8 9	WHEREAS, Approximately 3% to 10% of school-age children suffer from Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD), which leads to decreased academic achievement, impaired relationships with family and peers, and heightened risk for later drug use; and
10 11	WHEREAS, The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention estimates that ADHD imposed a societal "cost of illness" of \$36 billion to \$52 billion during 2005; and

WHEREAS, In the early 1970s, Ben Feingold, a California physician, reported that a diet lacking foods containing color additives, artificial flavorings, and naturally occurring salicylates helped some patients who had hyperactivity and other related behavioral problems; and

WHEREAS, Since 1977, 25 double—blind, placebo—controlled studies on the impact of FD&C Yellow No. 5 and other color additives on children's behavior have been described in scientific literature; and

WHEREAS, Thirteen double-blind, placebo-controlled studies on FD&C Yellow No. 5, including two sponsored by the British Food Standards Agency (FSA) that were published in 2004 and 2007, found that eliminating certain color additives from food helped reduce hyperactivity and other behavioral problems in some children; and

WHEREAS, Ignoring the large body of scientific evidence, the United States Food and Drug Administration (FDA) states on its website that there is "no evidence that food color additives cause hyperactivity or learning disabilities in children"; and



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1 WHEREAS, At the urging of the FSA and because of consumer concerns about  $\mathbf{2}$ artificial additives, some multinational companies selling foods in both Britain and the 3 United States, including Kraft, Mars, Kellogg, McDonald's, Coca-Cola, General Mills, 4 Quaker, Haribo, and PepsiCo, which includes Walkers/Frito-Lay, use few or no color 5 additives in foods sold in Britain while using color additives routinely in many foods 6 sold in the United States; and 7 WHEREAS, On July 8, 2008, the European Parliament approved a measure 8 requiring packaged foods containing certain color additives to bear a notice stating 9 that color additives "may have an adverse effect on activity and attention in children"; 10 and

WHEREAS, Americans consume about one—third of their food in restaurants and other food service facilities; and

WHEREAS, While the FDA requires that color additives be included on the ingredient statement for packaged foods containing color additives, persons consuming food in restaurants and other food service facilities have no way of knowing if the consumed food contains a color additive; and

WHEREAS, The appropriate public health approach to the scientific evidence on the effect that color additives have on behavior is to remove color additives from the food supply or at least require warning labels; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND, That the United States Congress is urged to enact legislation that bans the use of the following color additives in food sold, served, or distributed in the United States:

- 23 (1) FD&C Blue No. 1;
- 24 (2) FD&C Blue No. 2;
- 25 (3) FD&C Green No. 3;
- 26 (4) FD&C Orange B;
- 27 (5) FD&C Red No. 3;
- 28 (6) FD&C Red No. 40;
- 29 (7) FD&C Yellow No. 5; and
- 30 (8) FD&C Yellow No. 6; and be it further
