FISCAL AND POLICY NOTE

House Bill 260 (Delegates King and Kipke) Health and Government Operations

State Government - Commemorative Days - Juvenile Diabetes Day

This bill requires the Governor to annually proclaim April 6 as Juvenile Diabetes Day.

Fiscal Summary

State Effect: Commemorating Juvenile Diabetes Day does not affect State finances.

Local Effect: None.

Small Business Effect: None.

Analysis

Current Law: Six official commemorative days and two months are recognized in State law as shown in **Exhibit 1**. The Governor also must issue a proclamation each year encouraging citizens and other individuals to observe a moment of silence at 3 p.m. on Memorial Day to unite in remembrance and commemorate the heroic acts and efforts of Marylanders who have served and died in the U.S. armed forces.

Background: Juvenile diabetes, or Type 1 diabetes is an autoimmune disease in which the body's immune system destroys the insulin-producing cells of the pancreas. Diagnosis most often occurs in childhood and adolescence, although it can appear at any age. People with diabetes take insulin injections or infuse insulin through a pump to manage blood sugar levels. However, insulin is not a cure. Juvenile diabetes can still lead to kidney failure, blindness, nerve damage, amputations, heart attack, and stroke.

According to the Juvenile Diabetes Research Foundation, as many as three million Americans may have Type 1 diabetes. Nationwide, over 15,000 children are diagnosed with diabetes each year. Juvenile diabetes accounts for 5 to 10% of all diagnosed cases of diabetes.
