Senate Bill 91

(Chair, Education, Health, and Environmental Affairs Committee)(By Request - Departmental - Agriculture)

Education, Health, and Environmental Affairs

Environmental Matters

Lawn and Turf Grass Seed - Testing and Labeling Requirements

This departmental bill extends the time period, from 9 to 15 months, within which cool season lawn and turf grass seed may be sold, offered or exposed for sale, or transported in the State after it has been tested to determine the percentage of germination required to be included on seed labels. The bill also requires cool season lawn and turf grass seed to be labeled with a "sell by" date that falls within 15 months from the month following the date of the test.

Fiscal Summary

State Effect: The bill does not directly affect State operations or finances.

Local Effect: None.

Small Business Effect: The Maryland Department of Agriculture (MDA) has determined that this bill has minimal or no impact on small business (attached). Legislative Services concurs with this assessment.

Analysis

Current Law: A person may not sell, offer or expose for sale, or transport any agricultural, vegetable, herb, flower, tree, or shrub seed in the State unless the test to determine the percentage of germination included on seed labels is completed within nine months (exclusive of the month in which the test is completed) immediately prior to the sale, exposure or offer for sale, or transportation. "Agricultural seed" includes the seed

of any grass, forage, cereal, or fiber crop and any other kind of seed commonly recognized in the State as agricultural, field, or lawn seed, and mixtures of these seeds.

Background: According to MDA, turf grass research has shown that the germination rate of cool season grass seed has more longevity than other crop seeds. MDA advises that the bill makes State law consistent with language in the Recommended Uniform State Seed Law developed by the Association of American Seed Control Officials, and the Federal Seed Act (7 U.S.C. §1551 *et seq.*) and implementing regulations. Furthermore, MDA indicates that the establishment of a "sell by" date will facilitate inspection of seed lots for compliance and give consumers a readily visible quality control measure.
