Health and Government Operations Education, Health, and Environmental Affairs

Public Health Surveillance - Confidentiality

This departmental bill clarifies that reports submitted by physicians, health care institutions, and laboratories regarding a communicable disease or condition are confidential and not discoverable or admissible as evidence in any civil or criminal matter except in accordance with a court order sealing the court record. The bill does not apply to reports, information, or records that are available to the public or required to be publicly disclosed.

Fiscal Summary

State Effect: The bill does not materially affect governmental finances.

Local Effect: None.

Small Business Effect: The Department of Health and Mental Hygiene has determined that this bill has minimal or no impact on small business (attached). Legislative Services concurs with this assessment.

Analysis

Current Law: All physician, hospital, and laboratory reportable disease reports are considered confidential; not open to the public; and subject to subpoena or discovery in any criminal or civil proceeding only pursuant to a court order sealing the court record. However, reports relating to Human Immunodeficiency Virus and Acquired Immunodeficiency Syndrome are not discoverable or admissible as evidence in any civil or criminal matter.

Background: DHMH advises that this bill is the result of proposed language discussed in a summer workgroup set up by the Office of Epidemiology and Disease Control Programs within DHMH. The workgroup was formed at the suggestion of the Chair of the House, Health, and Government Operations Committee after similar language was removed from a bill (HB 393) that passed during the 2008 session.

DHMH reports that it has been advised by the Office of the Attorney General that certain information gathered in the course of a public health investigation, including certain personal information identifying an individual is not protected under current statute. DHMH advises that, under the bill, specific information resulting from and obtained during an investigation of a report of a communicable disease or condition is confidential.
