A BILL ENTITLED

1 AN ACT concerning

2 Motor Vehicles – Approaching Emergency Vehicles and Personnel

FOR the purpose of requiring drivers approaching an emergency vehicle that is stopped, standing, or parked on a highway and using any visual signals, unless otherwise directed by a police officer or traffic control device, to vacate the lane closest to the emergency vehicle under certain circumstances or to slow to a reasonable and prudent speed that ensures the safety of the emergency services personnel under certain circumstances; and generally relating to the rules of the road when approaching emergency vehicles and personnel.

1 otherwise directed by a police officer, shall drive immediately to a position parallel to 2 and as close as possible to the edge or curb of the roadway, clear of any intersection.

3 (c) On the immediate approach of an emergency vehicle using audible and 4 visual signals that meet the requirements of § 22–218 of this article or of a police 5 vehicle lawfully using an audible signal, the driver of every other vehicle, unless 6 otherwise directed by a police officer, shall stop and stay in this position until the 7 emergency vehicle has passed.

8 (d) A driver, when proceeding in the same direction as an emergency or 9 police vehicle, may not pass an emergency vehicle using audible and visual signals 10 that meet the requirements of § 22–218 of this article or a police vehicle lawfully using 11 an audible signal unless:

- (1) The emergency vehicle has stopped; or

(e) UNLESS OTHERWISE DIRECTED BY A POLICE OFFICER OR A TRAFFIC
CONTROL DEVICE, WHEN AN EMERGENCY VEHICLE USING ANY VISUAL SIGNAL
THAT MEETS THE REQUIREMENTS OF § 22–218 OF THIS ARTICLE IS STOPPED,
STANDING, OR PARKED ON A HIGHWAY, THE DRIVER OF A MOTOR VEHICLE
APPROACHING THE EMERGENCY VEHICLE FROM THE REAR SHALL:

19(1) ON A HIGHWAY THAT IS DIVIDED INTO TWO OR MORE20CLEARLY MARKED LANES FOR VEHICULAR TRAFFIC MOVING IN THE SAME21DIRECTION, VACATE THE LANE CLOSEST TO THE EMERGENCY VEHICLE; OR

22 (2) IF THE DRIVER OF THE MOTOR VEHICLE IS UNABLE TO 23 VACATE THE LANE CLOSEST TO THE EMERGENCY VEHICLE, OR ON A HIGHWAY 24 THAT HAS ONLY ONE LANE OF TRAVEL MOVING TOWARD THE EMERGENCY 25 VEHICLE, REDUCE THE SPEED OF THE MOTOR VEHICLE TO A REASONABLE AND 26 PRUDENT SPEED THAT ENSURES THE SAFETY OF THE EMERGENCY SERVICES 27 PERSONNEL.

28 **(F)** This section does not relieve the driver of an emergency vehicle from the 29 duty to drive with due regard for the safety of all persons.

30 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect
 31 October 1, 2010.
