## A BILL ENTITLED

| 13<br>14                 | SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:  |
| 15                       | Article – Criminal Law  |
| 16                       | 6–402.  |
| 17<br>18                 | (a) A person may not enter or trespass on property that is posted conspicuously against trespass by:  |
| 19                       | (1) signs placed where they reasonably may be seen; or  |
| 20                       | (2) paint marks that:   |
| 21<br>22                 | (i) conform with regulations that the Department of Natural Resources adopts under § 5–209 of the Natural Resources Article; and  |

This section also applies to property that is used as a housing project and

operated by a housing authority or State public body, as those terms are defined in

- 1 Division II of the Housing and Community Development Article, if an authorized
- 2 agent of the housing authority or State public body gives the required notice specified
- 3 in subsection (a) or (b) of this section.
- 4 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect
- 5 October 1, 2010.
