HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

1 A House Joint Resolution concerning

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Secondary Schools - C	ardioi	pulmonary	' Kesuscitation	Instruction
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- FOR the purpose of urging each county board of education and the Baltimore City
 Board of School Commissioners to make available American Red Cross
 Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) instruction, the American Heart
 Association's Heart Saver CPR curriculum, or an equivalent program to high
 school students in the county or Baltimore City.
- WHEREAS, Each year approximately 1,200,000 Americans will suffer an acute myocardial infarction, of which approximately 500,000 will die. Coronary heart disease is the nation's single leading cause of death; and
 - WHEREAS, Approximately 75% to 90% of all out-of-hospital cardiac arrests occur at home. Therefore, the ability to properly perform CPR can be the difference between the life and death of a loved one; and
 - WHEREAS, Approximately 95% of cardiac arrest victims die before reaching the hospital. Medical research confirms brain death commences 4 to 6 minutes after an individual experiences cardiac arrest if CPR or defibrillation does not occur within this time period; and
 - WHEREAS, Effective bystander CPR, provided immediately after the commencement of cardiac arrest, can double a victim's chance of survival. CPR helps maintain a vital blood flow to the heart and brain and increases the amount of time that an electric shock from a defibrillator may be effective; and
 - WHEREAS, Maryland maintains one of the premier Emergency Medical Service Systems in the nation. Nevertheless, the vast majority of the citizens of the State, including high school students, are incapable of properly performing CPR when confronted with a life—threatening situation; and
 - WHEREAS, There are many benefits high school students can derive from learning CPR, including acquisition of knowledge and skills that can save lives,



awareness and mental preparation for emergency situations, increased confidence, enhanced self—esteem, and a sense of contribution to the community; and

WHEREAS, Since efforts to teach CPR to adults have been disappointing, the instruction of CPR to high school students is the best means of, over time, educating the population of the State regarding the benefits and need for lifesaving CPR instruction. Studies indicate that high school students are more interested in learning new skills such as CPR and that they acquire the knowledge more quickly and retain it for a longer period of time. Additionally, high school students are frequently more involved in community activities and, therefore, are likely to encounter emergency situations necessitating the use of CPR; and

WHEREAS, If high school students throughout the State received CPR instruction, these young adults would be properly prepared to respond to emergencies including cardiac arrest and choking episodes and, therefore, would be able to provide basic lifesaving emergency care; and

WHEREAS, Exposure to CPR instruction will stimulate interest in advanced first aid instruction and the pursuit of health care professional training. In addition, it will foster involvement and membership in community fire departments, emergency medical services, and ambulance companies throughout the State, therefore enhancing the prompt response of trained emergency medical service providers to the citizens of the State; and

WHEREAS, High schools situated throughout the State provide an appropriate venue for the instruction of lifesaving CPR training; and

WHEREAS, With current fiscal constraints on local boards of education budgets, it is strongly encouraged that each local board of education and the Baltimore City Board of School Commissioners pursue, in partnership with local chapters of the American Red Cross and the American Heart Association, local career and volunteer fire and emergency medical services and ambulance companies, local hospitals and health systems, and medical associations, a cooperative means of providing CPR instruction to high school students at a cost that accommodates local board of education budgets; and

WHEREAS, It is strongly encouraged that on the satisfactory completion of CPR instruction, a high school student should receive credit equal to the number of hours it took the student to complete the CPR instruction towards the community service required for graduation from a public high school in the State; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND, That each county board of education in the State and the Baltimore City Board of School Commissioners are urged to offer American Red Cross or American Heart Association CPR instruction, or an equivalent program, to high school students in the county or Baltimore City; and be it further
