A BILL ENTITLED

1	AN ACT concerning	
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Vehicle Laws - Vehicle Approaching Emergency or Police Vehicle - Duty to Change Lane or Slow Down

- 4 FOR the purpose of requiring drivers approaching emergency or police vehicles 5 stopped, standing, or parked on a highway and using any visual signals, except 6 when otherwise directed by a police officer, to vacate the lane closest to the 7 emergency or police vehicle under certain circumstances or to slow to a speed 8 that is sufficient to ensure the safety of police officers or emergency services 9 personnel in the vicinity of the emergency or police vehicle under certain circumstances; and generally relating to requiring drivers to take certain 10 actions when approaching emergency or police vehicles on a highway. 11

- 17 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF 18 MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:
- 19 Article Transportation
- 20 21–405.
- 21 (a) On the immediate approach of an emergency vehicle using audible and visual signals that meet the requirements of § 22–218 of this article or of a police vehicle lawfully using an audible signal, the driver of every other vehicle, unless otherwise directed by a police officer, shall yield the right–of–way.



- (b) On the immediate approach of an emergency vehicle using audible and visual signals that meet the requirements of § 22–218 of this article or of a police vehicle lawfully using an audible signal, the driver of every other vehicle, unless otherwise directed by a police officer, shall drive immediately to a position parallel to and as close as possible to the edge or curb of the roadway, clear of any intersection.
- (c) On the immediate approach of an emergency vehicle using audible and visual signals that meet the requirements of § 22–218 of this article or of a police vehicle lawfully using an audible signal, the driver of every other vehicle, unless otherwise directed by a police officer, shall stop and stay in this position until the emergency vehicle has passed.
- (d) A driver, when proceeding in the same direction as an emergency or police vehicle, may not pass an emergency vehicle **THAT IS** using audible and visual signals that meet the requirements of § 22–218 of this article or a police vehicle lawfully using an audible signal unless:
 - (1) The emergency vehicle has stopped; or
- 16 (2) Otherwise directed by a police officer.
- 17 (e) EXCEPT AS OTHERWISE DIRECTED BY A POLICE OFFICER, WHEN AN 18 EMERGENCY OR POLICE VEHICLE USING ANY VISUAL SIGNAL IS STOPPED, 19 STANDING, OR PARKED ON A HIGHWAY, THE DRIVER OF A VEHICLE 20 APPROACHING THE EMERGENCY OR POLICE VEHICLE FROM THE REAR, AS SOON 21 AS IT IS SAFE, SHALL:
- 22 (1) IF THE VEHICLE IS TRAVELING ON A HIGHWAY WITH TWO OR
 23 MORE LANES OF TRAFFIC MOVING IN THE DIRECTION THAT THE EMERGENCY OR
 24 POLICE VEHICLE IS FACING, VACATE THE LANE CLOSEST TO THE EMERGENCY
 25 OR POLICE VEHICLE; OR
 - (2) IF THE VEHICLE IS TRAVELING ON A HIGHWAY WITH ONLY ONE LANE OF TRAFFIC MOVING IN THE DIRECTION THAT THE EMERGENCY OR POLICE VEHICLE IS FACING AND THE POSTED SPEED LIMIT IS 35 MILES PER HOUR OR GREATER, REDUCE THE SPEED OF THE VEHICLE TO A SPEED THAT IS SUFFICIENT TO ENSURE THE SAFETY OF POLICE OFFICERS OR EMERGENCY SERVICES PERSONNEL IN THE VICINITY OF THE EMERGENCY OR POLICE VEHICLE.
- **(F)** This section does not relieve the driver of an emergency vehicle from the duty to drive with due regard for the safety of all persons.
- SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect October 1, 2010.
