## A BILL ENTITLED

1 AN ACT concerning

2 **Criminal Procedure – Victim’s Compensation – Temporary Lodging for**  
3 **Domestic Violence Victims**

4 FOR the purpose of making certain victims eligible for certain monetary awards for  
5 temporary lodging for a certain period from the Criminal Injuries Compensation  
6 Fund; and generally relating to awards from the Criminal Injuries  
7 Compensation Fund.

8 BY repealing and reenacting, with amendments,  
9 Article – Criminal Procedure  
10 Section 11–811  
11 Annotated Code of Maryland  
12 (2008 Replacement Volume and 2009 Supplement)

13 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF  
14 MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

15 **Article – Criminal Procedure**

16 11–811.

17 (a) (1) (i) Except as otherwise provided in this subsection, an award  
18 under this subtitle shall be made in accordance with the schedule of benefits, as it  
19 existed on January 1, 2001, and degree of disability as specified in Title 9, Subtitle 6 of  
20 the Labor and Employment Article and any other applicable provisions of the Labor  
21 and Employment Article, except for Title 9, Subtitle 8 of the Labor and Employment  
22 Article.

23 (ii) For determining the amount of an award under this subtitle,  
24 the term “average weekly wages” does not include tips, gratuities, and wages that are

1 undeclared on the claimant's State or federal income tax returns for the applicable  
2 years.

3 (iii) If a claimant does not have "average weekly wages" to  
4 qualify under the formula in Title 9, Subtitle 6 of the Labor and Employment Article,  
5 the award shall be in an amount equal to the average of the maximum and minimum  
6 awards listed in the applicable portion of that subtitle.

7 (2) An award for loss of earnings or support made under this subtitle  
8 may be up to two-thirds of the victim's gross average wage, but may not be less than  
9 the amount provided in paragraph (1) of this subsection.

10 (3) The parent or guardian of a victim who is a child and who resides  
11 with the victim may be eligible for an award of up to 30 days of lost earnings as a  
12 result of caring for the victim.

13 (4) An award for funeral expenses may not exceed \$5,000.

14 (5) Subject to the limitation under subsection (b)(3) of this section and  
15 § 11-812 of this subtitle, a person who is eligible for an award as the result of the  
16 death of a victim or psychological injury may be eligible, under the regulations that  
17 the Board adopts, to receive psychiatric, psychological, or mental health counseling.

18 (6) Subject to the limitation under subsection (b)(6) of this section and  
19 § 11-812 of this subtitle, a parent, child, or spouse of a victim who resides with the  
20 victim and who is eligible for an award as the result of the injury of a victim is eligible  
21 to receive psychiatric, psychological, or mental health counseling.

22 **(7) A VICTIM OF DOMESTIC VIOLENCE IS ELIGIBLE TO RECEIVE**  
23 **AN AWARD FOR THE REASONABLE COSTS OF UP TO 14 DAYS OF TEMPORARY**  
24 **LODGING.**

25 (b) Compensation awarded under this subtitle may not exceed:

26 (1) for a disability-related or dependency-related claim:

27 (i) except as provided in item (ii) of this paragraph, \$25,000; or

28 (ii) if the injury to the victim results in permanent total  
29 disability, up to an additional \$25,000 after a disability-related claim has been  
30 awarded to the victim;

31 (2) \$45,000 for a medical claim;

32 (3) \$5,000 for each claimant for psychiatric, psychological, or mental  
33 health counseling under subsection (a)(4) of this section;

1           (4)    except as provided in item (1)(ii) of this subsection, a total of  
2   \$45,000, including any subsequent and supplemental awards;

3           (5)    \$250 for each claimant for repair, replacement, or cleaning of  
4   property damaged, soiled, or littered as a result of a crime or law enforcement  
5   investigation of a crime; or

6           (6)    for an award for psychiatric, psychological, or mental health  
7   counseling made under subsection (a)(6) of this section:

8                   (i)    \$1,000 for each claimant; and

9                   (ii)   \$5,000 for each incident.

10          (c)    An award made under this subtitle shall be reduced by the amount of any  
11   payments received or to be received as a result of the injury:

12                   (1)    from or on behalf of the offender;

13                   (2)    except as provided in item (3) of this subsection, from any other  
14   public or private source, including an award of the State Workers' Compensation  
15   Commission under the Maryland Workers' Compensation Act;

16                   (3)    from any proceeds of life insurance in excess of \$25,000; or

17                   (4)    as an emergency award under § 11–813 of this subtitle.

18          (d)    If there are two or more persons entitled to an award as a result of the  
19   death of a victim, the award shall be apportioned among the claimants.

20          (e)    The Board may negotiate a settlement with a health care provider for the  
21   medical and medically related expenses.

22          SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect  
23   October 1, 2010.
