- FOR the purpose of authorizing the State Board of Education to develop curriculum content for a certain course in chess instruction; authorizing county boards of education to implement certain instruction in certain schools under certain circumstances; and generally relating to the implementation of a course in chess instruction in the public schools in the State.

- WHEREAS, Chess increases strategic thinking skills, stimulates intellectual creativity, and improves problem—solving ability while raising self—esteem; and
- WHEREAS, When students play chess, they must call on higher-order thinking skills, analyze actions and consequences, and visualize future possibilities; and
- WHEREAS, In countries where chess is offered widely in schools, students excel in math and science; and
- WHEREAS, The Governor of the State of Maryland has declared the importance of promoting science, technology, engineering, and math education in the public schools to prepare students for the future and to allow Maryland to lead the nation in the number of science and technology jobs; now, therefore,



- SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:
- 3 Article Education
- 4 **4–111.1.**
- 5 (A) THE STATE BOARD MAY DEVELOP CURRICULUM CONTENT FOR A SEMESTER-LONG COURSE IN CHESS INSTRUCTION.
- 7 (B) IF THE STATE BOARD DEVELOPS CURRICULUM CONTENT UNDER 8 SUBSECTION (A) OF THIS SECTION, A COUNTY BOARD MAY IMPLEMENT THE 9 CHESS INSTRUCTION IN ELEMENTARY, MIDDLE, OR HIGH SCHOOLS IN THE 10 COUNTY.
- SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect October 1, 2010.
