11. Description and Purpose of Project (Limit Length to Visible area)

The Capital Area Food Bank is a critical source of food for most of the organizations serving the hungry in the Washington metropolitan area. Unfortunately, we are stretched to our limits in our current space. And, even as this space shortage has caused the food bank's distribution to plateau, the need for our services has rapidly continued to climb. A study just released by Feeding America, America's food bank network, revealed that the CAFB is now serving 478,100 people annually – an increase of 25% over 2006. Much of this need is in Prince George's and Montgomery counties, where 1 in 5 children are at risk of hunger. In order to address the growing needs of the community, the food bank's capacity must also grow. Therefore, the CAFB has purchased property and plans to build 100,000 square feet of warehouse space and renovate 25,000 square feet of office and training space. A new food distribution facility will allow us to more than double the amount of fresh food and produce we distribute, and to bring our annual distribution up to 40 million meals within 5 years of opening the new site. The project price is currently \$36M. CAFB remains a wise investment; since 1980, we've distributed \$500 million worth of food.

28. Comments: (Limit Length to Visible area)

While doubling both the food bank's size and distribution capabilities, the move to a new facility will have only a modest impact on our ongoing expenses. No additional staff will be required in the first few years of operations, and new costs will be limited to the higher utility and maintenance required by the bigger space. The total increase in cost per year is estimated at \$154,000. Out of a \$10.76M budget, this reflects a negligible increase overall.
