10. Description and Purpose of Grantee Organization (Limit Length to Visible area)								

For 78 years, the Washington County Museum of Fine Arts (WCMFA) has been the premier cultural center for Western Maryland. The Museum's mission is "to collect, to preserve, to interpret, and to exhibit art of lasting quality for the citizens of Hagerstown and the surrounding region." More than 60,000 visitors come to the Museum each year to enjoy world-class exhibitions, concerts, lectures, and arts education classes. The Museum is also an important economic driver for the region: our economic impact is estimated at \$4-6 million per year. The first landmark building was a gift of Hagerstown native Anna Brugh Singer and her husband, noted American Impressionist painter William Henry Singer, Jr. The goal of the WCMFA is to welcome all members of the community, and WCMFA has never charged an admission fee. WCMFA maintains close ties with the Washington County Public School System, the Washington County Arts Council, the Maryland Symphony Orchestra, the Maryland Theater and the Washington County Free Library, in addition to civic organizations. The Museum has an outstanding permanent collection of over 7,000 works of art.

11. Description and Purpose of Project (Limit Length to Visible area)

WCMFA intends to install a glazed roof over the building's central courtyard, the largest space (3,000 square feet) in the Museum. This area will be used as a sculpture court for objects from the permanent collection, utilized for orientation of tour groups, including the 6,000 school children who visit the facility annually, the elderly, and disabled, as well as for bus tours from outside of the region. It will provide an additional venue in the building for lectures, music, and Museum education events, a snack area and a plein-air space for community receptions.

Architecture also plays an important symbolic and emotional role in our community. The covered courtyard will provide the citizens of Hagerstown and Western Maryland with a free, accessible, uplifting public space. It will become a destination point in the area, and make people proud to be citizens of this region. This will add greatly to the quality of life and will also function as an important economic development tool. The project has now gone to bid for a contractor. The project is shovel-ready and is expected to complete by the winter of 2011. The impact of our jobscreating project will be large, as over 21% of Washington County's population is employed in the construction, transportation and material moving occupations; the unemployment rate is 9.7%.

28. Comments: (Limit Length to Visible area)

The Courtyard Enclosure project will employ architects, engineers, designers, steel and glass manufacturers, contractors, and subcontractors, including heavy equipment operators, electricians, roofers, steel and glass installers, plumbers, brick and concrete masons. The 42 DIRECT MARYLAND JOBS and the 14 NATIONAL DIRECT JOBS include the people who will actually do the work on the project. The 7 DIRECT JOBS SAVED IN MARYLAND are those of the architects and HVAC engineers who have kept work because of this project and one museum guard, who will guard the construction entry. The 42 indirect Maryland jobs and the 14 indirect National jobs created are based on the calculations developed by the White House to evaluate the success of the federal stimulus effort. The 1.4 DIRECT NATIONAL JOBS saved is based on 10% of the number of direct national direct jobs created. The Museum project will, therefore, contribute to County, State, and National recovery.

WCMFA is regarded as one of the finest small art museums in the United States. The collection is held in trust for all of the citizens of Maryland. Funds from the State to improve the building will allow WCMFA to better safeguard these treasures and to display more of them to the public, free of an admission charge.

WCMFA receives operating funds through the Grants for Organizations program of the Maryland State Arts Council (traditionally 7% of the operating budget annually). However, the majority of our funding comes from local donors, City and County governments and endowment income. The WCMFA is a fiscally responsible institution and we do not carry debt.

Our 78 years of service to the region have been marked by the acquisition of a nationally notable art collection, national accreditation by the American Association of Museum since 1976, a continuous commitment to art education through the Museum Art School more than 75 years of continuous exhibition opportunities for the region's artists, and a host of important exhibition and collections catalogues.

The WCMFA is a treasure belonging collectively to the citizens of the region and the state. Dedicated volunteers support and enhance the programs of the WCMFA through thousands of hours of contributed services annually. Volunteers serve on the Board of Trustees, every Committee of the Museum, and in the formal volunteer group, the Singer Society. They welcome the public, operate the Museum shop, provide public receptions, and give docent guided tours. They organize public programs, family festivals, and annual fund raising events.
