10. Description and Purpose of Grantee Organization (Limit Length to Visible area)							
The Sandy Spring Museum was established in 1980 as the community was experiencing a rapid change in population and personality. A rural setting of farms, pasture land and winding roads was becoming a bedroom community of four-lane intersections and upscale commuters. The Museum offers programs that link all members of the changing community to a local history rich in social reform, progressive farming techniques, innovation, education, and cultural achievement. We invite the public not just to learn about the past, but to claim a piece of that legacy as its own, and							

invite the public not just to learn about the past, but to claim a piece of that legacy as its own, and to use this knowledge to build the future. At the start of its 30th anniversary, the Museum partners with academic institutions, other non-profits, local schools, and county heritage tourism to create a lifelong learning and community strengthening resource for the 21st century.

## 11. Description and Purpose of Project (Limit Length to Visible area)

The project is to close a shortfall in capital funding that occurred in late 2008, forcing the cancellation of finishing and equipping the Museum's new Library. Pledges to the building campaign, scheduled to be completed in 2008, were withdrawn due to the economic crisis. The Museum absorbed many essential capital costs out of 2009 operating funds, exhausting the capital reserve. The Museum cancelled several related capital projects -- the post-construction resurfacing of the Museum parking lot, the reassembly of a historic wooden structure deposited with us in the summer of 2008, the completion of a partially grant-funded outdoor sign, and the installation of HVAC units for the Museum's rural life interpretive areas, also partially funded by a grant from the county. This bond bill would restore the lost capital funds and permit the completion of cancelled capital projects of 2009 and the partially-funded capital improvements in 2010.

## 28. Comments: (Limit Length to Visible area)

Sandy Spring Museum has reached a critical transition point in its ability to preserve and interpret history in ways that enrich the community. The principal effort of the last ten years has been to build and equip a facility where collections and documents can be stored, and education programs and community outreach can occur. That major capital program, including several hundred thousand dollars in bond funding from the state, resulted in the opening of a nearly complete library and archive building in 2007 and collection of most of the remaining capital pledges by the end of FY 2008. Not surprisingly, some of the pledges had to be written off in 2008.

Maximizing the value of that capital investment in the Museum's physical plant requires completing the capital renovations and restoring the operating reserves depleted in the effort to complete the capital project despite the vanished pledges.

We are developing programs that will generate an appropriate operating revenue stream. In order to accomplish that objective, the Museum board of trustees guided a leadership transition in 2008 that culminated in the hiring of the Museum's first trained museum professional as a full-time director in September 2008. Her focus for the first year has been to put the administration of the Museum in order and to build an identity for the Museum based on history and community service

This included adding a National History Day programs, developing a lecture series focused on Sandy Spring's African American history, and initiating intellectual collaboration with the University of Maryland, College Park and UMBC. SSM built the mission focus into special events too, in part by creating a partnership with Montgomery General Hospital to honor the centennial of Hospital founder Dr. Jacob Wheeler Bird. Finally, SSM has updated the Museum logo, promotional literature, and designed a new lighted outdoor sign, all to more clearly presentat our historical and community service mission. These projects were funded by grants from Heritage Montgomery, the Maryland Historical Trust, and the Maryland Humanities Council/PNC Bank Legacy project. For 2010, we have joined a national internship placement program, applied for planning funds from the National Endowment for the Humanities for a major interpretive project around the Underground Railroad, sustained our annual lecture series and added historic tours, and a partnership with the Olney Theatre Center.
