	10. Description and Purpose of Grantee Organization (Limit Length to Visible area)							
The Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission (M-NCPPC) was created by the Maryland General Assembly in 1927 as a bi-county regional agency serving Montgomery and Prince George's counties. The Montgomery County Department of Parks is a key agency of the M-NCPPC, the proud steward of 410 parks on over 34,000 acres of parkland. Our mission is to protect and interpret our valuable natural and cultural resources; balance the demand for recreation with the need for conservation; offer a variety of enjoyable recreational activities that encourage healthy lifestyles; and provide clean, safe, and accessible places for leisure-time activities. Our vision is of an enjoyable, accessible, safe and green park system that promotes a strong sense of community through shared spaces and experiences and is treasured by the people it serves. We support and embrace the differences among our employees and the public we serve, and offer suitable programs, activities and services. We offer a range of leisure activities that strengthen the body, sharpen the mind, and renew the spirit.								

11. Description and Purpose of Project (Limit Length to Visible area)

The Wu Wei Tai Chi group, in partnership with the Montgomery County Dept. of Parks, seeks funds for a practice court & contemplation center in Cabin John Regional Park, a project heartily approved by the MC Park & Planning Board in May, 2009. The diverse group of area residents has met there every Saturday in all weather since 1997, led until 2005 by David C. Chen, their late founder and teacher. With 700 signatories in support, the project honors his teaching over many years in the region, and his continued inspiration to the large tai chi community. One of them notes: "We build memorials to people, but what we salute are really the ideas they championed, the things they did, the power of their vision." Tai chi is an ancient martial art form that is traditionally practiced outdoors, providing healthful exercise through old age for mind and body balance. The court's design itself symbolizes tai chi, in its harmony with the peaceful setting, nestled in the ground without walls, its yin-yang sign in flagstone representing the balance and interdependence of opposing forces in nature. Landscaped with benches, it also invites observation & contemplation.

28. Comments: (Limit Length to Visible area)

There is only one tai chi court, to our knowledge, in the US. This court will be a unique mind-body fitness resource in our area for tai chi, that can be used as well for yoga, dance, and martial arts.

Cabin John Regional Park is one of our most popular and scenic regional parks with its 524 acres of woods, streams, athletic fields, indoor and outdoor tennis, ice skating, nature center, picnic facilities, trails, miniature train, outdoor theater, and summer campground. Located in the Bethesda-Rockville-Potomac intersections of bustling shopping malls and sedate residential neighborhoods; within a few blocks from both the Capital Beltway and I-270, the park itself represents a harmonious balance of nature, recreational and athletic facilities, and its visitors representative of the diversity of Montgomery County and the greater Metropolitan area.

The Montgomery County Department of Parks advocates the tai chi court as an appropriate addition in many respects to the park, as a dedicated, harmonious place for tai chi, a gentle exercise form that also invites the participation of our growing senior population; is conducive to other healthful activities including yoga and meditation; involves low maintenance, is aligned to our mission and vision; encourages community collaboration; and represents the area's cultural diversity.

This court is a project conceptualized by the Wu Wei Tai Chi Club, a county group, whose energy and passion brought it to the attention of Parks as a potential Public-Private Partnership project. The site is currently not in use for any other purpose, nor will it negatively impact current facilities and activities around it. The plan was refined by Parks architects and engineers for tree protection and other environmental and structural concerns. The project was then presented with staff recommendations to the Montgomery County Park and Planning Board that enthusiastically approved and endorsed the project.

The Parks budget, very limited in the current economy, has no provisions for the cost of this project. This bond bill funding of \$40,000 is crucial. The Wu Wei Club's committee has already raised part of the matching funds, and Parks staff will work with the group to raise the balance. We submit that this is a worthy project which will bring a significant public resource to the county and the Washington, DC metropolitan area.
