# Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission - Human Resources PG/MC 105-10

This bill repeals requirements that the Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission (WSSC) submit specified information regarding its merit system or classified service to the Secretary of Budget and Management. The bill also repeals provisions of law regarding testing requirements for filling vacant positions under the merit system or classified service.

## **Fiscal Summary**

**State Effect:** None.

**Local Effect:** None. The bill is procedural in nature and has no significant fiscal or operational effect on WSSC.

Small Business Effect: None.

### **Analysis**

**Current Law:** WSSC must report several items relating to its merit system or classified service to the Department of Budget and Management, including any changes in a rule or regulation regarding its merit system or classified service; a list of positions and corresponding salaries in its merit system or classified service; reasons for these position classifications; and a list of individuals meeting minimum testing requirement for WSSC jobs. Failure of the Secretary to act on this information within 60 days constitutes approval.

**Background:** WSSC is the eighth largest water and wastewater utilities in the country, providing water and sewer services to 1.8 million residents in Montgomery and Prince George's counties. It has over 460,000 customer accounts, serves an area of around 1,000 square miles, and currently employs more than 1,500 people. The agency operates four reservoirs, two water filtration plants, and six wastewater treatment plants. Additionally, the Blue Plains Water Pollution Control Plant handles as much as 169 million gallons per day under a cost-sharing agreement with WSSC. The agency maintains nearly 5,500 miles of water main lines and over 5,300 miles of sewer main lines.

WSSC advises that the bill repeals obsolete provisions of law regarding human resources at WSSC and has no significant fiscal or operational effect on the agency.
