The Little Sisters of the Poor is a Congregation of religious women who have devoted their lives to serving the needy elderly throughout the world. The Congregation was founded in France in 1839 by Saint Jeanne Jugan, and the first Little Sisters arrived in Baltimore, Maryland in 1869. Since that time they have sheltered an estimated 15,000 elderly men and women of very limited financial means — without regard to race, religion or ethnic background. The Little Sisters of the Poor welcome the elderly poor as family, providing a safe and comfortable home where their dignity is maintained and they are cared for with the utmost love and respect until death.								

## 11. Description and Purpose of Project (Limit Length to Visible area)

The project consists of the removal of an existing 13 year old Trane centrifugal chiller due to catastrophic failure and the installation of two (2) McQuay WMC Magnetic High Efficiency Chillers. The existing chiller ceased performing in August 2009 and due to a history of failures and the magnitude of the current failure, it was determined that it would not be cost beneficial to repair. In order to ensure elderly resident comfort during the cooling season, it is essential to have a redundant/standby chiller. The second chiller will result in a significantly extended useful life of both chillers versus one single continuously operating chiller. In addition, the redundant chiller would eliminate the need to rent a portable chiller when extended repairs are required – St. Martin's Home incurred approximately \$64,000 of chiller rental costs in the fall of 2009 while the existing chiller was inoperable. Further, our engineers tell us that the McQuay Chillers are the most efficient and provide the greatest cost and energy savings.

The replacement of the chillers is the first phase in the planned energy efficiency upgrade of the entire 202,000 square foot facility.

St. Martin's Home offers a continuum of care in a home-like, non-institutional setting. By striving to provide the best level of medical care possible, Residents at St. Martin's Home live a long healthy life; hospital admissions are minimal. When the Residents do have occasion to visit the hospital their length of stay is often less than their peers because of the care and services available at the Home.
Impact on the community: St. Martin's provides salaried jobs and opportunities for community service. Currently, 121 lay women and men are employed. Over the course of the last 12 months, we have been the beneficiaries of the service involvement of an estimated 215 volunteers and, during that same period, an estimated 30 high-school and college age students have fulfilled service requirements at St. Martin's.
Members of the greater community participate in religious services and events held at St. Martin's throughout the year.
St. Martin's serves as a clinical training site for those enrolled in Nursing certification programs and Geriatric Nursing Assistant courses of study.
