8	THAT TRAINS TEACHERS AND ADMINISTRATORS TO IMPLEMENT THE POLICY
9	ADOPTED UNDER SUBSECTION (B) OF THIS SECTION.
10	(G) AN EMPLOYEE OF A NONPUBLIC SCHOOL WHO REPORTS AN ACT OF
11	BULLYING, HARASSMENT, OR INTIMIDATION IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE
12	NONPUBLIC SCHOOL'S POLICY ADOPTED UNDER SUBSECTION (B) OF THIS
13	SECTION IS NOT CIVILLY LIABLE FOR ANY ACT OR OMISSION IN REPORTING OR
14	FAILING TO REPORT AN ACT OF BULLYING, HARASSMENT, OR INTIMIDATION IN
15	ACCORDANCE WITH THE POLICY.
16	(H) THE PROVISIONS OF THIS SECTION MAY NOT BE CONSTRUED TO:
