A BILL ENTITLED

1 AN ACT concerning

2 **Request to Place a Statue of Harriet Tubman in the National Statuary Hall**
3 **Collection**

4 FOR the purpose of requesting that the Joint Committee on the Library of Congress
5 approve the replacement of the statue of the Honorable John Hanson with a
6 statue of Harriet Tubman in the National Statuary Hall Collection in the
7 United States Capitol; providing certain information to the Joint Committee on
8 the Library of Congress in accordance with the Procedure for Replacement of
9 Statues in the National Statuary Hall Collection; specifying that the Harriet
10 Tubman Statue Commission will represent the State in selecting a sculptor;
11 specifying that a coalition of interested individuals, nonprofit organizations, and
12 other groups will supply the funds to be used for certain purposes related to the
13 statue; requiring the Governor to appoint members of the Harriet Tubman
14 Statue Commission; requiring the Governor to submit certain documents to the
15 Architect of the Capitol; and generally relating to a request to place a statue of
16 Harriet Tubman in the National Statuary Hall Collection.

17 Preamble

18 WHEREAS, By act of Congress, each state is invited to provide statues, not
19 exceeding two in number, of deceased persons who have been citizens of the state and
20 illustrious for their historic renown or for distinguished civic or military services, as
21 the state shall determine to be worthy of national commemoration in a national
22 statuary hall; and

1 WHEREAS, The State of Maryland in years past did provide for the placing of
2 two statues of distinguished citizens of Maryland in the National Statuary Hall
3 Collection in the United States Capitol; and

4 WHEREAS, One of the statues is of the Honorable John Hanson, born in 1715,
5 who was a Maryland merchant and delegate to the Continental Congress. From 1781
6 to 1782, he served as President of the United States in Congress assembled under the
7 Articles of Confederation. This was largely a ceremonial role, and after a 1-year term,
8 Hanson retired to the country, where he died in 1783; and

9 WHEREAS, John Hanson can best be honored by locating his statue in a place
10 of honor in Annapolis, the capital of the State of Maryland, where it may be enjoyed by
11 our citizens and visitors; and

12 WHEREAS, The citizens of the State of Maryland wish to replace the statue of
13 John Hanson with a statue of Harriet Tubman for placement in the National Statuary
14 Hall Collection in recognition of her many contributions to the State and to the nation,
15 including her work on the Underground Railroad and as a Union spy during the Civil
16 War; now, therefore,

17 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF
18 MARYLAND, That:

19 (a) The State of Maryland requests that the Joint Committee on the Library
20 of Congress approve the replacement of Maryland's statue of the Honorable John
21 Hanson in the National Statuary Hall Collection with a statue of Harriet Tubman.

22 (b) (1) In accordance with the Procedure for Replacement of Statues in
23 the National Statuary Hall Collection, the State of Maryland submits the following
24 information in paragraphs (2), (3), (4), and (5) of this subsection for consideration by
25 the Joint Committee on the Library of Congress.

26 (2) Harriet Tubman, a citizen of Maryland, was born a slave under the
27 given name Araminta Ross in Dorchester County, Maryland, in about 1820. Beaten
28 severely as a child, she also suffered a traumatic head injury at the hand of a slave
29 owner early in her life which caused a lifetime of headaches, seizures, and visions. In
30 1849, she fled north to freedom and then immediately returned to Maryland, risking
31 her life to free her family. She joined the Underground Railroad, which was a secret
32 network for free African Americans and white sympathizers who helped runaways
33 escape the South. She became a conductor on the Underground Railroad, risking her
34 life time and time again to return to Maryland and lead slaves to freedom. Known as
35 "the Moses of her people," she was so successful that furious slaveholders put a huge
36 price on her head. When the Civil War began, she became a Union spy, organizing an
37 espionage network of slaves and freedmen who operated behind Confederate lines. On
38 several occasions, she led military raiding parties and also tended to the Union
39 wounded as an army nurse. After the Civil War, she devoted herself to women's
40 suffrage, the care of orphans and invalids, and the establishment of freedmen's schools
41 in the South.

1 (3) The contributions of Harriet Tubman to the State of Maryland and
2 to the country merits inclusion of a statue of her in the National Statuary Hall
3 Collection.

4 (4) The Harriet Tubman Statue Commission will represent the State
5 in selecting the sculptor for the Harriet Tubman statue.

6 (5) The Harriet Tubman Statue Commission will consist of the
7 following seven members:

8 (i) one member of the Senate of Maryland, appointed by the
9 President of the Senate;

10 (ii) one member of the House of Delegates, appointed by the
11 Speaker of the House; and

12 (iii) five members, appointed by the Governor, who are
13 representatives from the nonprofit organizations and other groups that contributed to
14 the passage of this Act and will supply the funds under paragraph (6) of this
15 subsection; and

16 (6) A coalition of interested individuals, nonprofit organizations, and
17 other groups will supply the funds to be used to cover the costs of replacing the John
18 Hanson statue with a Harriet Tubman statue, including:

19 (i) paying the sculptor;

20 (ii) carving or casting the Harriet Tubman statue;

21 (iii) creating a pedestal and any desired inscription;

22 (iv) transporting the Harriet Tubman statue and pedestal to the
23 United States Capitol;

24 (v) removing and transporting the John Hanson statue from
25 Washington to Annapolis;

26 (vi) temporarily erecting the new Harriet Tubman statue in the
27 Rotunda of the Capitol for the unveiling ceremony;

28 (vii) expenses related to the unveiling ceremony; and

29 (viii) and any other expenses that may be incurred by the Harriet
30 Tubman Statue Commission.

31 (c) The Governor shall:

1 (1) appoint the members of the Harriet Tubman Statue Commission;
2 and

3 (2) as required by the Procedure for Replacement of Statues in the
4 National Statuary Hall Collection, submit to the Architect of the Capitol a copy of this
5 Act, along with a letter from the Governor requesting approval from the Joint
6 Committee on the Library of Congress to replace Maryland's statue of the Honorable
7 John Hanson with a statue of Harriet Tubman.

8 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect
9 October 1, 2011.
