## A BILL ENTITLED

1 AN ACT concerning

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## Request to Place a Statue of Harriet Tubman in the National Statuary Hall Collection

FOR the purpose of requesting that the Joint Committee on the Library of Congress approve the replacement of the statue of the Honorable John Hanson with a statue of Harriet Tubman in the National Statuary Hall Collection in the United States Capitol; providing certain information to the Joint Committee on the Library of Congress in accordance with the Procedure for Replacement of Statues in the National Statuary Hall Collection; specifying that the Harriet Tubman Statue Commission will represent the State in selecting a sculptor; specifying that a coalition of interested individuals, nonprofit organizations, and other groups will supply the funds to be used for certain purposes related to the statue; requiring the Governor to appoint members of the Harriet Tubman Statue Commission; requiring the Governor to submit certain documents to the Architect of the Capitol; and generally relating to a request to place a statue of Harriet Tubman in the National Statuary Hall Collection.

17 Preamble

WHEREAS, By act of Congress, each state is invited to provide statues, not exceeding two in number, of deceased persons who have been citizens of the state and illustrious for their historic renown or for distinguished civic or military services, as the state shall determine to be worthy of national commemoration in a national statuary hall; and

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WHEREAS, The State of Maryland in years past did provide for the placing of two statues of distinguished citizens of Maryland in the National Statuary Hall Collection in the United States Capitol; and

WHEREAS, One of the statues is of the Honorable John Hanson, born in 1715, who was a Maryland merchant and delegate to the Continental Congress. From 1781 to 1782, he served as President of the United States in Congress assembled under the Articles of Confederation. This was largely a ceremonial role, and after a 1–year term, Hanson retired to the country, where he died in 1783; and

WHEREAS, John Hanson can best be honored by locating his statue in a place of honor in Annapolis, the capital of the State of Maryland, where it may be enjoyed by our citizens and visitors; and

WHEREAS, The citizens of the State of Maryland wish to replace the statue of John Hanson with a statue of Harriet Tubman for placement in the National Statuary Hall Collection in recognition of her many contributions to the State and to the nation, including her work on the Underground Railroad and as a Union spy during the Civil War; now, therefore,

- 17 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF 18 MARYLAND, That:
  - (a) The State of Maryland requests that the Joint Committee on the Library of Congress approve the replacement of Maryland's statue of the Honorable John Hanson in the National Statuary Hall Collection with a statue of Harriet Tubman.
  - (b) (1) In accordance with the Procedure for Replacement of Statues in the National Statuary Hall Collection, the State of Maryland submits the following information in paragraphs (2), (3), (4), and (5) of this subsection for consideration by the Joint Committee on the Library of Congress.
  - Harriet Tubman, a citizen of Maryland, was born a slave under the given name Araminta Ross in Dorchester County, Maryland, in about 1820. Beaten severely as a child, she also suffered a traumatic head injury at the hand of a slave owner early in her life which caused a lifetime of headaches, seizures, and visions. In 1849, she fled north to freedom and then immediately returned to Maryland, risking her life to free her family. She joined the Underground Railroad, which was a secret network for free African Americans and white sympathizers who helped runaways escape the South. She became a conductor on the Underground Railroad, risking her life time and time again to return to Maryland and lead slaves to freedom. Known as "the Moses of her people," she was so successful that furious slaveholders put a huge price on her head. When the Civil War began, she became a Union spy, organizing an espionage network of slaves and freedmen who operated behind Confederate lines. On several occasions, she led military raiding parties and also tended to the Union wounded as an army nurse. After the Civil War, she devoted herself to women's suffrage, the care of orphans and invalids, and the establishment of freedmen's schools in the South.

1 2 3	(3) The contributions of Harriet Tubman to the State of Maryland and to the country merits inclusion of a statue of her in the National Statuary Hall Collection.
4 5	(4) The Harriet Tubman Statue Commission will represent the State in selecting the sculptor for the Harriet Tubman statue.
6 7	(5) The Harriet Tubman Statue Commission will consist of the following seven members:
8 9	(i) one member of the Senate of Maryland, appointed by the President of the Senate;
10 11	(ii) one member of the House of Delegates, appointed by the Speaker of the House; and
12 13 14 15	(iii) five members, appointed by the Governor, who are representatives from the nonprofit organizations and other groups that contributed to the passage of this Act and will supply the funds under paragraph (6) of this subsection; and
16 17 18	(6) A coalition of interested individuals, nonprofit organizations, and other groups will supply the funds to be used to cover the costs of replacing the John Hanson statue with a Harriet Tubman statue, including:
19	(i) paying the sculptor;
20	(ii) carving or casting the Harriet Tubman statue;
21	(iii) creating a pedestal and any desired inscription;
22 23	(iv) transporting the Harriet Tubman statue and pedestal to the United States Capitol;
24 25	(v) removing and transporting the John Hanson statue from Washington to Annapolis;
26 27	(vi) temporarily erecting the new Harriet Tubman statue in the Rotunda of the Capitol for the unveiling ceremony;
28	(vii) expenses related to the unveiling ceremony; and
29 30	(viii) and any other expenses that may be incurred by the Harriet Tubman Statue Commission.
