- 12 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF 13 MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

Article – Courts and Judicial Proceedings

(a) The provisions of this section apply to a hearing conducted in accordance
with § 3-815, § 3-817, § 3-819, or § 3-823 of this subtitle or a review hearing
conducted in accordance with § 5-326 of the Family Law Article in which a child is
placed under an order of guardianship, commitment, or shelter care.

(b) (1) In a hearing conducted in accordance with § 3–815, § 3–817,
§ 3–819, or § 3–823 of this subtitle, the court shall make a finding whether the local
department made reasonable efforts to prevent placement of the child into the local
department's custody.

$7\\ 8\\ 9\\ 10\\ 11\\ 12\\ 13$	(3) In a hearing conducted in accordance with § 3–815, § 3–817, or § 3–819 of this subtitle, before determining whether a child with a developmental disability or a mental illness is a child in need of assistance, the court shall make a finding whether the local department made reasonable efforts to prevent placement of the child into the local department's custody by determining whether the local department agreement under § 5–525(b)(1)(i) or (iii) of the Family Law Article.

16 17 18	(5) The court's finding under this subsection shall assess the efforts made since the last adjudication of reasonable efforts and may not rely on findings from prior hearings.

21 22 23	(1) The extent to which a local department has complied with the law, regulations, state or federal court orders, or a stipulated agreement accepted by the court regarding the provision of services to a child in an out-of-home placement;
24	(2) Whether a local department has ensured that:

29 30 31	(iii) The caseworker is knowledgeable about the case and has received on a timely basis all pertinent files and other information after receiving the assignment from the local department;
32 33 34 35	(3) For a hearing under § 3–823 of this subtitle, whether a local department has provided appropriate services that facilitate the achievement of a permanency plan for the child, including consideration of in–State and out–of–state placement options;

1 (4) Whether the child's placement has been stable and in the least 2 restrictive setting appropriate, available, and accessible for the child during the period 3 since the most recent hearing held by the court;

4 (5) Whether a local department notified the court and all parties 5 before any change of placement for the child, or, if emergency conditions made a 6 change necessary, as soon as possible after the change of placement;

7 (6) On receipt of a report of maltreatment of a child occurring while 8 the child is in the custody of a local department, whether the local department 9 provided the appropriate parties, including the child's attorney, a report or notice of a 10 report of the suspected maltreatment of the child and of the disposition of the 11 investigation within the time required by regulation and court order; and

12 (7) Whether a local department has provided appropriate and timely 13 services to help maintain the child in the child's existing placement, including all 14 services and benefits available in accordance with State law, regulations, state and 15 federal court orders, stipulated agreements, or professional standards regarding the 16 provision of services to children in out-of-home placements.

17 (d) In making a finding in accordance with subsection (b) of this section, a 18 court may not consider a potential loss of federal funding for placement of a child that 19 may result from a determination that reasonable efforts were not made.

20 (e) A court shall make the findings required under subsection (b) of this 21 section in writing if it finds that reasonable efforts are being made for a child, but also 22 finds that at least one of the following conditions exists:

(1) A local department did not comply with law, regulations, court
 orders, or agreements described in subsection (c)(1) of this section;

25 (2) A local department did not ensure continuity of casework as 26 described in subsection (c)(2) of this section;

27 (3) A local department did not provide the services described in
28 subsection (c)(3) of this section;

(4) During the period since the most recent court hearing, the child
has not been placed in a stable placement or in the least restrictive setting
appropriate, available, and accessible for the child;

32 (5) A local department failed to provide reports or notices of reports in 33 a timely manner as described in subsection (c)(5) or (6) of this section; or

34 (6) A local department has not provided the services described in 35 subsection (c)(7) of this section.

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1 (f) If the court finds that reasonable efforts for a child were not made in 2 accordance with subsection (b) of this section or finds that reasonable efforts were 3 [not] made **BUT THAT ONE OF THE CONDITIONS DESCRIBED IN SUBSECTION (E)** 4 **OF THIS SECTION EXISTS**, the court promptly shall send its written findings to:

- 5 (1) The director of the local department;

- (2) The Social Services Administration;

7 (3) The State Citizens Review Board for Children established under §
8 5–535 of the Family Law Article;

9 (4) If applicable, the local citizens review panel established under 10 § 5–539.2 of the Family Law Article; and

11 (5) Any individual or agency identified by a local department or the 12 court as responsible for monitoring the care and services provided to children in the 13 legal custody or guardianship of the local department on a systemic basis.
