CHAPTER	

1 AN ACT concerning

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Request to Place a Statue of Harriet Tubman in the National Statuary Hall Collection

FOR the purpose of requesting that the Joint Committee on the Library of Congress approve the replacement of the statue of the Honorable John Hanson with a statue of Harriet Tubman in the National Statuary Hall Collection in the United States Capitol; providing certain information to the Joint Committee on the Library of Congress in accordance with the Procedure for Replacement of Statues in the National Statuary Hall Collection: specifying that the Harriet Tubman Statue Commission will represent the State in selecting a sculptor; specifying that a coalition of interested individuals, nonprofit organizations, and other groups will supply the funds to be used for certain purposes related to the statue; requiring the Governor to appoint members of the Harriet Tubman Statue Commission; requiring the Governor to submit certain documents to the Architect of the Capitol a certain exception to allow the State of Maryland to place a statue of Harriet Tubman in the National Statuary Hall Collection, or for the statue to otherwise be given certain prominence, in addition to certain existing Maryland representatives in the collection; requesting the members of the Maryland congressional delegation to pursue this exception through the Joint Committee on the Library of Congress; and generally relating to a request to place a statue of Harriet Tubman in the National Statuary Hall Collection.

1 2 3	WHEREAS, The State of Maryland is proud of the national and State contributions of the two individuals, Charles Carroll of Carrollton and John Hanson, whose statues have formed a part of the National Statuary Hall Collection since 1903;
4 5	<u>WHEREAS, Charles Carroll of Carrollton is revered as a statesman and the</u>
6	only Catholic signer of the Declaration of Independence; and
7 8 9 10 11	WHEREAS, Charles Carroll was a spokesman against the actions of the colonial Governor of Maryland writing under the famous pseudonym, the "First Citizen"; was commissioned by Benjamin Franklin and Samuel Chase to seek aid from England in the War for Independence; served in the Continental Congress, as the first United States Senator from Maryland, as State Senator, and as Senate President; and helped
12	draft the Maryland Constitution; and
13 14 15	WHEREAS, John Hanson was one of the strongest colonial advocates of independence and was active in raising troops and providing arms while serving in the Maryland General Assembly;
16 17 18 19 20 21 22	WHEREAS, John Hanson served as a delegate to the Continental Congress and was unanimously elected President of the "United States in Congress Assembled" under the Articles of Confederation and, as the presiding officer of Congress, was responsible for initiating a number of programs that established a world position for the new country, including the beginnings of a consular service, a post office department, chartering of a national bank, progress towards taking the first census, and adoption of a uniform system of coinage; and
23 24 25	WHEREAS, The State of Maryland is a place of rich and diverse history that reaches far beyond the boundaries of the State and is unparalleled by most other states in the country; and
26 27 28 29 30	WHEREAS, In addition to the statues honoring two men who risked their lives and fortunes to support and advocate for our nation's independence, the State of Maryland recognizes the national contributions of a third individual and wishes to contribute a third statue in honor of another patriot and fighter for freedom in our country, Harriet Tubman; and
31 32 33	WHEREAS, Harriet Tubman escaped slavery in the State of Maryland and went on to become one of the most prominent "conductors" of the Underground Railroad guiding slaves to freedom; and
34 35 36 37	WHEREAS, Harriet Tubman was a premier national leader in the movement to fight against slavery and for women's suffrage, and served the Union Army and our country during the Civil War, first as a cook and nurse, and later as an armed scout and spy; and

$\frac{1}{2}$	WHEREAS, It would benefit the nation and visitors to the nation's Capitol to be made aware of Harriet Tubman's contributions if an exception were made and an
3 4	additional statue for Maryland were permitted in the National Statutory Hall Collection; and
5 6	WHEREAS, The Congress of the United States has permitted other states to add statues to the National Statuary Hall Collection; now, therefore,
7 8	SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND, That:
9 10	(a) (1) The General Assembly of Maryland respectfully requests that an exception be made to allow the State of Maryland to place a third statue in the
11 12 13	National Statuary Hall Collection, in addition to the existing Maryland representatives of John Hanson and Charles Carroll, or for the third statue to otherwise be given great prominence.
14 15 16	(2) The third statue would be of Harriet Tubman, an African American woman and most notable national hero for her contributions to the history of our country.
17 18 19 20 21	(b) The General Assembly respectfully requests the members of the Maryland congressional delegation to pursue, through the Joint Committee on the Library of Congress, the exception requested under this Act to allow a third statue in Statuary Hall that would recognize the significance of Harriet Tubman in the history of Maryland and the nation.
22	WHEREAS, By act of Congress, each state is invited to provide statues, not
$\frac{23}{24}$	exceeding two in number, of deceased persons who have been citizens of the state and illustrious for their historic renown or for distinguished civic or military services, as
$\frac{24}{25}$	the state shall determine to be worthy of national commemoration in a national
26	statuary hall; and
27	WHEREAS, The State of Maryland in years past did provide for the placing of
28	two statues of distinguished citizens of Maryland in the National Statuary Hall
29	Collection in the United States Capitol; and
30	WHEREAS, One of the statues is of the Honorable John Hanson, born in 1715,
31	who was a Maryland merchant and delegate to the Continental Congress. From 1781
32	to 1782, he served as President of the United States in Congress assembled under the
33 34	Articles of Confederation. This was largely a ceremonial role, and after a 1-year term, Hanson retired to the country, where he died in 1783; and
35	WHEREAS, John Hanson can best be honored by locating his statue in a place
36	of honor in Annapolis, the capital of the State of Maryland, where it may be enjoyed by

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our citizens and visitors; and

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WHEREAS, The citizens of the State of Maryland wish to replace the statue of John Hanson with a statue of Harriet Tubman for placement in the National Statuary Hall Collection in recognition of her many contributions to the State and to the nation, including her work on the Underground Railroad and as a Union spy during the Civil War: now. therefore.

6 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF 7 MARYLAND. That:

- (a) The State of Maryland requests that the Joint Committee on the Library of Congress approve the replacement of Maryland's statue of the Honorable John Hanson in the National Statuary Hall Collection with a statue of Harriet Tubman.
- 11 (b) (1) In accordance with the Procedure for Replacement of Statues in 12 the National Statuary Hall Collection, the State of Maryland submits the following 13 information in paragraphs (2), (3), (4), and (5) of this subsection for consideration by 14 the Joint Committee on the Library of Congress.
 - Harriet Tubman, a citizen of Maryland, was born a slave under the (2)given name Araminta Ross in Dorchester County, Maryland, in about 1820. Beaten severely as a child, she also suffered a traumatic head injury at the hand of a slave owner early in her life which caused a lifetime of headaches, seizures, and visions. In 1849, she fled north to freedom and then immediately returned to Maryland, risking her life to free her family. She joined the Underground Railroad, which was a secret network for free African Americans and white sympathizers who helped runaways escape the South. She became a conductor on the Underground Railroad, risking her life time and time again to return to Maryland and lead slaves to freedom. Known as "the Moses of her people," she was so successful that furious slaveholders put a huge price on her head. When the Civil War began, she became a Union spy, organizing an espionage network of slaves and freedmen who operated behind Confederate lines. On several occasions, she led military raiding parties and also tended to the Union wounded as an army nurse. After the Civil War, she devoted herself to women's suffrage, the care of orphans and invalids, and the establishment of freedmen's schools in the South.
- 31 (3) The contributions of Harriet Tubman to the State of Maryland and 32 to the country merits inclusion of a statue of her in the National Statuary Hall 33 Collection.
 - (4) The Harriet Tubman Statue Commission will represent the State in selecting the sculptor for the Harriet Tubman statue.
- 36 (5) The Harriet Tubman Statue Commission will consist of the 37 following seven members:
- 38 (i) one member of the Senate of Maryland, appointed by the 39 President of the Senate:

1	(ii) one member of the House of Delegates, appointed by the		
2	Speaker of the House; and		
3	(iii) five members, appointed by the Governor, who are		
4	representatives from the nonprofit organizations and other groups that contributed to		
5	the passage of this Act and will supply the funds under paragraph (6) of this

7	(6) A coalition of interested individuals, nonprofit organizations, and		
8	other groups will supply the funds to be used to cover the costs of replacing the John		
9	Hanson statue with a Harriet Tubman statue, including:

10	(i) paying the sculptor;		
11	(ii) carving or easting the Harriet Tubman statue;		
12	(iii) creating a pedestal and any desired inscription;		
13	(iv) transporting the Harriet Tubman statue and pedestal to the		
14	United States Capitol;

15	(v) removing and transporting the John Hanson statue from		
16	Washington to Annapolis;		
10	Washington to Immapone,		
17	(vi) temporarily erecting the new Harriet Tubman statue in the		
18	Rotunda of the Capitol for the unveiling ceremony;		
10	recording of the capitor for the university,		
19	(vii) expenses related to the unveiling ceremony; and		
10	(vii) empenses related to the drivering ecremony, and		
20	(viii) and any other expenses that may be incurred by the Harriet		
21	Tubman Statue Commission.

22	(c) The Governor shall:		
23	(1) appoint the members of the Harriet Tubman Statue Commission;

25	(2) as required by the Procedure for Replacement of Statues in the		
26	National Statuary Hall Collection, submit to the Architect of the Capitol a copy of this		
27	Act, along with a letter from the Governor requesting approval from the Joint		
28	Committee on the Library of Congress to replace Maryland's statue of the Honorable		
29	John Hanson with a statue of Harriet Tubman.		
30	SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect		
31	October 1, 2011.
