Over its 98-year history, the Junior League of Baltimore (JLB) has trained women to be civic leaders. The JLB has responded to direct service needs in our community, started not-for-profits, advocated on issues impacting women and children, and led non-profit boards on the local, state and national levels. Whether in the corporate, non-profit, or volunteer arena, the Junior League has consistently developed women's leadership and fiscal acumen while heightening their sense of civic responsibility. By collaborating to build coalitions, identify community needs, and develop effective and responsive programs to serve those needs, the Junior League has established a long and proud tradition of service. With its mission-driven emphasis to train women to serve as community leaders, the JLB is proud that last year its members volunteered over 25,000 hours of community service. Junior League programs and projects: increased awareness of childhood obesity, provided mentoring for at-risk women through our Wise Penny internship, supported the parents and children of Govan's Elementary School, shared the gift of song to the elderly & disabled, and provided the community access to free healthcare information and screenings.								

11. Description and Purpose of Project (Limit Length to Visible area)

The Junior League of Baltimore's Thrift Store and Community Space capital project allowed the Junior League to build a second floor on to its existing Wise Penny Thrift Store, wholly owned and operated by the Junior League. This facility provides a space for on site volunteer training and community projects, as well as permanently houses its member headquarters. In addition, updates & renovations were needed for the Wise Penny Thrift Store, a critical resource to local neighbors. The JLB has leveraged this resource to carry out work in the community and in its fundraising efforts to support these important initiatives. The Wise Penny Thrift Store Internship program has now graduated 10 interns and aided them in seeking gainful employment. League functions such as an annual Health Fair, a community forum on childhood obesity, general membership & committee meetings and membership trainings are all held in the new headquarters space. The League also now provides an important resource center for the community. Local residents have used our space to host baby and wedding showers, homecomings for our service men & women, and family reunions. External non-profits and businesses use our resource space each month to hold association meetings, trainings, host speakers, teach classes, and more.

The Junior League of Baltimore has been making a positive impact in our communities for almost 100 years. Since 1912, the League has been a driving force behind many of the initiatives and institutions that make our community strong, including; The Flower Mart, The Maryland School for the Blind and the Deaf, Santa Claus Anonymous, The Ronald McDonald House, The Waxter Center for Senior Citizens, The Baltimore Baseball League, and The Hampden Family Center.

The Internship program at the Wise Penny Thrift Store provides not just work experience, it provides ongoing one-on-one mentoring including; coaching in workplace culture, resume writing, mock interview skills and specific skills training. Job placement assistance and extended mentoring opportunities are available at the successful completion of the intern's internship. Launched in the summer of 2009 with two interns selected from the Waverly Family Support Center, the Wise Penny internship program has now graduated ten women. Each woman has demonstrated a need and interest in gaining work experience and individual coaching to aid them in seeking gainful employment. One intern was even hired in as a part-time associate in the Wise Penny Thrift Store, and has worked in this position for almost a year.

The Junior League is extremely involved with the community and business associations, having just recently partnered with organizations such as the Govanstowne Business Association, the Maryland Women's Heritage Center, Mercy High School, the Girl Scouts of Central Maryland & Loyola.

Almost half of the JLB members live either within our district, or in the city of Baltimore. Other members live in Baltimore, Howard and Harford Counties. Members of the Junior League reflect a wide range of backgrounds, interests and professional pursuits, yet they all share a commitment to voluntarism and improving the community. Through leadership training and development, the Junior League empowers women to build coalitions and take action in their communities. We look forward to celebrating a century of service to the Baltimore community, and continuing to provide an important community resource center to local residents.
