10. Description and Purpose of Grantee Organization (Limit Length to Visible area)							
Port Discovery provides a safe, fun, and nurturing place where children and families can learn and play together. Its mission is to provide experiences that ignite imagination, inspire learning, and nurture growth through play. The museum plays a vital role in providing "play to learn" experiences that lay the groundwork not only for academic success but also for lifelong learning. With an annual attendance of approximately 250,000 and a total attendance of over 3,000,000 visitors, Port Discovery ranks in the top ten of over 300 children's museums in the country and is one of the most visited family destinations in the Baltimore area. Port Discovery is truly distinctive because it focuses entirely on children from birth to age ten and offers age-appropriate activities designed to awaken each child's imagination, creativity, and talents. All of the Museum's curriculum-based exhibits and programs correlate to Maryland's educational reform standards. Museum services include structured school visits, state-subsidized admissions for school groups, after-school programs, free and low-cost community-based programs, family memberships, corporate memberships, overnights, catered events, and general admission.							

11. Description and Purpose of Project (Limit Length to Visible area)

Port Discovery Children's Museum's Green Renovation Project is being implemented over a 10-year period, with a final goal of LEED certification in 2017. The project is divided up into six parts:
1) LEED Assessment and Strategy Development (2008); 2) Design of Phase 1 Projects (2008-10);
3) Construction/Installation of Phase 1 Projects (2009-12); 4) Design of Phase 2 Projects (2012-14); 5) Construction/Installation of Phase 2 Projects (2013-16); and 6) Final LEED Assessment (2017).

We are currently addressing construction/installation of Phase 1 Projects including, but not limited to: replacement of the HVAC system; replacement of the roof; installation of a new generator; improved visitor amenities; improved exterior door and vestibule; more efficient and effective interior lighting; creation of an outdoor activity/exhibit space; and the installation of new exhibit spaces. Phase 2 Projects will be developed by the Museum based on the recommendations of its architect and building advisory committee. Each of these capital projects will be designed to move the Museum toward its long-term goal of LEED certification.

Port Discovery is located in the old Fish Market, a 104 year-old building in Baltimore's Inner Harbor. The age and historic nature of the building requires significant planning and maintenance to ensure the protection and upkeep of the building, as well as the health and safety of our 250,000 annual visitors. Additionally, each of the capital projects included in this project will be designed, constructed, and operated in a mode that moves the Museum toward its long-term goal of LEED certification. This project will also support the museum's goals by increasing "play-to-learn" exhibits and opportunities for young children in their formative years, ages birth to ten.

The effects and benefits of coming to Port Discovery are as diverse as the experience. Parents who visit Port Discovery experience the joy of learning through play with their children and learn new ways to use educational play with their children beyond the visit. Children who visit Port Discovery better understand themselves, have improved interactions with and understanding of others, and increase their knowledge of and connection to the world around them. Children who come to Port Discovery are exposed to a range of concepts, ideas, and subjects that support their learning in more structured environments. Visitors to Port Discovery play with diverse groups from different economic, social, religious, and cultural backgrounds. In addition, children are exposed to the arts and physical activity, two areas that are often the first to be cut from the public school system. Here at Port Discovery, children of all socioeconomic levels, races, and abilities participate together in a variety of developmentally-appropriate experiences designed to promote the physical, social, and intellectual growth and well-being of our youngest citizens.
