2 State Procurement – Preference – Local Supplies – Matching Bids

- FOR the purpose of requiring a unit of State government to allow a certain bidder to
 resubmit the bid to match the lowest bid, under certain circumstances, if the
 bidder's bid indicates, of all the bids submitted, the use of the highest
 percentage of supplies to be purchased or used in the procurement that are local
 supplies; defining a certain term; and generally relating to preferences for
 businesses using local supplies in procurement contracts.

- 14 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF 15 MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

18 (A) IN THIS SECTION, "LOCAL SUPPLIES" MEANS SUPPLIES WHOSE 19 VALUE, EITHER IN WHOLE OR IN PART, IS DERIVED FROM GROWING, 20 PRODUCING, PROCESSING, ASSEMBLING, OR MANUFACTURING ACTIVITIES THAT 21 OCCUR WITHIN A FACILITY LOCATED IN THE STATE.

(B) WHEN A UNIT USES COMPETITIVE SEALED BIDDING TO AWARD A
 PROCUREMENT CONTRACT, THE UNIT SHALL ALLOW A BIDDER TO RESUBMIT
 THE BID IN ORDER TO MATCH THE LOWEST BID IF:

1	(1) THE BID IS WITHIN 10% OF THE LOWEST BID;
2	(2) THE BID INDICATES, OF ALL THE BIDS SUBMITTED, THE USE
3	OF THE HIGHEST PERCENTAGE OF SUPPLIES TO BE PURCHASED OR USED IN
4	THE PROCUREMENT THAT ARE LOCAL SUPPLIES;
5	(3) THE BIDDER IS A RESPONSIBLE BIDDER; AND
6	(4) THE RESUBMISSION OF THE BID DOES NOT CONFLICT WITH A
7	FEDERAL LAW OR GRANT AFFECTING THE PROCUREMENT CONTRACT.
8	SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect
9	October 1, 2012.
