CHAPTER _____

1 AN ACT concerning

2 **Calvert County – School Buses – Length of Operation**

3 FOR the purpose of altering the length of time a school bus may be operated in Calvert
4 County; and generally relating to school bus operation in Calvert County.

5 BY repealing and reenacting, with amendments,
6 Article – Education
7 Section 7–804
8 Annotated Code of Maryland
9 (2008 Replacement Volume and 2011 Supplement)

10 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF
11 MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

12 **Article – Education**

13 7–804.

14 (a) In this section, “school vehicle” has the meaning stated in § 11–154 of the
15 Transportation Article.

16 (b) (1) Except as provided in paragraphs (2) and (3) of this subsection,
17 unless it fails to meet the applicable school bus and motor vehicle safety standards, a
18 school vehicle may be operated for 12 years.

1 (2) (i) In **CALVERT**, Caroline, Dorchester, Somerset, Talbot,
2 Wicomico, and Worcester counties, unless it fails to meet the applicable school bus and
3 motor vehicle safety standards, a school vehicle may be operated for 15 years.

4 (ii) A school vehicle operating under subparagraph (i) of this
5 paragraph shall be maintained as provided in subsection (c) of this section.

6 (3) Any school vehicle in operation or accepted before July 1, 2004, or
7 under contract to be purchased before July 1, 2004, that meets the specifications of the
8 Department and of the Motor Vehicle Administration for transit style school vehicles
9 may be operated for 15 years.

10 (c) Notwithstanding the 12-year limitation in subsection (b)(1) of this
11 section, a school vehicle may be operated for additional years if:

12 (1) The school vehicle is maintained under a preventive maintenance
13 plan approved by the Motor Vehicle Administration and the Automotive Safety
14 Enforcement Division of the Department of State Police that includes an inspection at
15 the end of the 12th year and a minimum of 2 inspections by the Motor Vehicle
16 Administration each year thereafter;

17 (2) Any structural repairs to the school vehicle necessitated by
18 accident, metal fatigue, or any other cause are certified by an independent expert
19 approved by the Motor Vehicle Administration to meet or exceed the manufacturer's
20 original manufacturing standards;

21 (3) The school vehicle is equipped with:

22 (i) The body originally placed on the chassis by the
23 manufacturer;

24 (ii) An 8 light warning system;

25 (iii) A left side stop arm;

26 (iv) A fire-retardant driver's seat;

27 (v) Fire-retardant barriers in the case of a school vehicle with a
28 front engine; and

29 (vi) A fire-retardant rear seating area in the case of a school
30 vehicle with a rear engine; and

31 (4) The State Superintendent grants approval.

1 (d) If a school vehicle passes an inspection that is required under subsection
2 (c)(1) of this section:

3 (1) The inspection shall be valid in the county in which the inspection
4 was completed; and

5 (2) If ownership of the school vehicle is transferred to a person who
6 operates the school vehicle in a county in which school vehicles are authorized under
7 subsection (b)(2) of this section to be operated for 15 years, the inspection shall be
8 valid in that county for the length of time that the inspection would have been valid in
9 the county where the inspection was completed.

10 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect
11 July 1, 2012.
