CHAPTER

1 AN ACT concerning

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Labor and Employment – Determination of Independent Contractor Status – Workplace Fraud Act and Unemployment Insurance – <u>Revisions</u>

FOR the purpose of establishing an exception for an employer that produces certain documents for inspection to the presumption that an employer-employee relationship exists for purposes of the Workplace Fraud Act; repealing the requirement that the Commissioner of Labor and Industry consider certain factors as strong evidence that an employer did not violate a certain provision of law; providing for a presumption, under certain circumstances, that an individual working for remuneration is an independent contractor under certain circumstances; prohibiting the Commissioner, under certain circumstances. from entering a place of business or work site to review and copy certain records; authorizing an employer to comply with a certain requirement to provide records by producing copies of the records; altering the number of days within which an employer is required to produce certain records; repealing a certain provision of law regarding the issuance of citations by the Commissioner for violations of the Workplace Fraud Act; requiring the Commissioner to take certain action regarding an alleged violation of the Workplace Fraud Act within a certain time after the Commissioner receives certain records from an employer; providing that an employer is entitled to a certain hearing within a
