Gift of a Statue of Harriet Tubman to the United States Government

- FOR the purpose of requesting that the Governor authorize the gift of a statue of Harriet Tubman to the United States government; requesting the Governor to request the United States Congress to place the statue in a certain building; requesting the Governor to establish the Harriet Tubman Statue Commission that, under the supervision and direction of the State Treasurer, would raise certain funds and be composed of certain members; and generally relating to the gift of a statue of Harriet Tubman to the United States government.
- WHEREAS, Harriet Tubman was born a slave under the given name Araminta Ross in Maryland in about 1820; and
- WHEREAS, Beaten severely as a child, she also suffered a traumatic head injury at the hand of a slave owner early in her life, which caused a lifetime of headaches, seizures, and vision difficulties; and
- WHEREAS, In 1849, she fled north to freedom and then immediately returned to Maryland, risking her life to free her family; and
- WHEREAS, She joined the Underground Railroad, which was a secret network for free African Americans and white sympathizers who helped runaways escape the South; and
- WHEREAS, She became a conductor on the Underground Railroad, risking her life time and time again to return to Maryland and lead slaves to freedom; and

3 4	WHEREAS, When the Civil War began, she became a Union spy, organizing an espionage network of slaves and freedmen who operated behind Confederate lines; and
5 6	WHEREAS, On several occasions, she led military raiding parties and also tended to the Union wounded as an army nurse; and
7 8 9	WHEREAS, After the Civil War, she devoted herself to women's suffrage, the care of orphans and invalids, and the establishment of freedmen's schools in the South; and
10 11	WHEREAS, The 100th anniversary of her death occurs on March 10, 2013; now, therefore, be it
12 13	RESOLVED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND, That the General Assembly requests the Governor to:
14 15	(1) authorize the gift of a statue of Harriet Tubman from the citizens of Maryland to the United States government;
16 17	(2) request the United States Congress to place the statue in the U. S. Capitol Building; and
18 19 20 21 22 23 24	(3) establish the Harriet Tubman Statue Commission that, under the supervision and direction of the State Treasurer, would raise private funds to be used to pay for costs associated with the statue and that would consist of five members, appointed by the Governor, who are representatives from the nonprofit organizations and other groups that contributed to the passage of this Resolution and will contribute to the funds to be used for paying for the costs associated with the statue; and be it further
