A BILL ENTITLED

1 AN ACT concerning

2 Office of Cemetery Oversight – Sunset Extension and Program Evaluation

3 FOR the purpose of continuing the Office of Cemetery Oversight in accordance with 4 the provisions of the Maryland Program Evaluation Act (Sunset Law) by $\mathbf{5}$ extending to a certain date the termination provisions relating to statutory and 6 regulatory authority of the Office; exempting private family cemeteries that do 7 not conduct public sales from certain permitting and registration, perpetual 8 care, and preneed contract requirements of the Maryland Cemetery Act; 9 altering the membership of the Advisory Council on Cemetery Operations; increasing the number of times the Advisory Council is required to convene each 10year; requiring the Director of the Office of Cemetery Oversight to include 11 12certain information regarding the number of registrants and permit holders in a 13 certain annual report; requiring the Director to provide a copy of certain annual reports to each member of the Advisory Council; requiring the Director, at 1415certain times, to deliver to each member of the Advisory Council certain 16 paperwork; requiring the Advisory Council to respond to issues raised in certain 17annual reports and develop a plan to study ongoing issues; authorizing a certain registration to be transferred under certain circumstances; requiring a certain 1819annual report to include certain information on the number of inquiries received 20by the Office; requiring an applicant for a permit to submit certain 21documentation to the Director; requiring a certain disclosure to be made in a 22certain manner; requiring the Office to provide a report on the implementation 23of certain recommendations to certain committees of the General Assembly on 24or before a certain date; requiring the Advisory Council to develop a plan for 25consumer outreach, study recordkeeping practices for cemeteries in a certain 26manner, and develop a legislative proposal on recordkeeping practices; 27requiring the Director and the Advisory Council to develop certain orientation 28materials and study the issue of the increasing rate of cremations and its effect 29on the Office's finances: requiring the Director and a committee formed of members of the Advisory Council to update the Office newsletter and develop a 30 31certain plan for updating the newsletter; making stylistic and technical

AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That, on or before October 1, 18 2013, the Office of Cemetery Oversight shall report to the Senate Finance Committee 19 and the House Health and Government Operations Committee, in accordance with § 20 2–1246 of the State Government Article, on the implementation status of nonstatutory 21 recommendations of the Department of Legislative Services contained in the sunset 22 evaluation report dated October 2011.

3 SECTION 4. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That the Director of the Office 4 of Cemetery Oversight and the Advisory Council on Cemetery Operations shall:

5 (1) collaborate on the development of orientation materials for new 6 members appointed to the Advisory Council, which shall include information on the 7 requirements of the Public Ethics Laws applicable to Advisory Council members;

8 (2) study the issue of the increasing rate of cremations within the 9 death care industry, including whether the rate of cremations will continue to rise at 10 the same rate and the possible effect this trend may have on the Office's finances.

11 SECTION 5. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That the Director of the Office 12 of Cemetery Oversight and a committee formed of members of the Advisory Council on 13 Cemetery Operations shall update the Office newsletter and develop a plan to ensure 14 that the newsletter continues to be updated on a regular basis.

15 SECTION 6. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect16 July 1, 2012.

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
