10. Description and Purpose of Grantee Organization (Limit Length to Visible area)

NCCF has served the national capital region for nearly 100 years. NCCF's mission is to create total, healthy living environments for vulnerable children, youth, and families, and the quality of life which empowers their ability to thrive and demonstrate responsibility. NCCF's residential programs serve homeless families, survivors of domestic violence, and abused and neglected adolescents. Other programs include foster care, adoption services, supportive services to stabilize families in the community, transitional housing to promote independent living, and prevention services to high-risk youth. Annually, NCCF serves more than 4,000 children, youth and families through 15 programs implemented by 158 employees and 1,400 volunteers. NCCF is accredited by the Maryland Association of Resources for Families and Youth (MARFY) and nationally by the Council on Accreditation COA). It is also a member of the Child Welfare league of America (CWLA), the Consortium for Child Welfare (CCW), and the DC Alliance of Youth Advocates (DCAYA). NCCF creates living environments that improve the basic health and well-being of children and families, and increases community safety.

11. Description and Purpose of Project (Limit Length to Visible area)

NCCF must be compliant with the State of Maryland regulation governing residential childcare programs (COMAR 14.31.06.12). We have received support from multiple sources during construction, but had setbacks with equipping the facility. NCCF was included in the Governor's initial 2011 capital budget; due to state budget cuts, was later removed and did not receive state support. Without full use of the Youth Activities Center, NCCF lacks adequate space on its Bethesda, MD campus for vigorous physical exercise, recreational activities, and the arts. Research shows that low levels of physical activity are associated with youth engaging in higher-risk activities, such as smoking, drug and alcohol abuse, risky sexual behavior, social isolation, lack of interest in education, depression and suicide. Physical and recreational activity facilitates positive youth development, playing a significant role in influencing behavioral patterns and preventing risky behaviors, and benefits their psychological and physical health, social interactions, peer influence, academic performance, community development, and other lifestyle behaviors. The facility houses a gymnasium, stage, arts studios, a kitchen/dining hall, educational/employment training center, exercise and recreation rooms, and a non-denominational chapel for daily use.

28. Comments: (Limit Length to Visible area)

The vision for Youth Activities Center is to offer an accessible and safe venue where multiple barriers faced by NCCF clients may be alleviated/replaced by goals that promote their abilities to live productively and independently in the community, maximizing the quality of their lives. Once equipped, the facility will house multiple programs which develop self esteem, teach character, and encourage each individual to reach for their ultimate potential.

Fundraising has been challenging. NCCF has been successful in securing public and private support to complete construction. We need Maryland Legislators and local elected officials to ensure the full realization of this project by equipping the facility because:

NCCF currently does not satisfy the Maryland regulation governing residential childcare programs (COMAR 14.31.06.12) which mandates the provision of indoor recreation and leisure activities for youth in group home care, based on youth needs and interests. NCCF has no such capacity to provide indoor recreation; which triggered NCCF's capital campaign to build the facility.

Increasing numbers of homeless children and their families need a place to eat, acquire workforce skills, receive parenting education, and learn how to maintain permanent housing. The modern commercial kitchen will be a resource to teach clients to eat healthfully and address health concerns such as obesity, cardiovascular disease, diabetes, and other diseases for which the populations we serve are at increased risk. Such diseases place a greater burden on the health system.

Youth served by NCCF have experienced abuse and neglect at the hands of adults. These youth are often also involved in the juvenile justice system, and need services to increase their chances at education and employment, and decrease their risk of engaging in criminal activities. Without these services, they pose a greater risk to public safety and security.

With high unemployment, the financial stresses on families are real and affect how parents respond to their children. Parents become depressed, withdrawn and quick to anger. Their use of physical punishment often increases. All children and youth, regardless of their socioeconomic status, need the opportunity to prepare their bodies, minds and hearts for life.

Legislators need to ensure the full realization of the Youth Activities Center, because we are at risk of losing a generation of children if we do not provide additional support for families under duress. We should care about what it means to a child to lose a home or have stressed, unemployed parents. Families are under pressure, and children are vulnerable to what their parents feel. This facility will be a safe place to socialize thousands of homeless children, and out-of-home youth who predictably struggle with aggression, anger, and self-esteem.
