10. Description and Purpose of Grantee Organization (Limit Length to Visible area)

Baltimore Healthy Start is the largest infant mortality reduction program in the State of Maryland and the City of Baltimore, serving approximately 1200 extremely low income women (98% African American) annually. It is also one of the nations most successful efforts in addressing disparities in low birth weight births and is a part of network of 105 federally-funded Healthy Start projects located in vulnerable urban, rural, tribal, and border communities throughout our nation. The organizations successful community-focused approaches rely heavily on conducting aggressive outreach to find and enroll pregnant and postpartum women residing in the catchment areas of its Client Service Centers. It then, in a very holistic fashion, provides these families with intensive case management, home-visiting, medical care coordination, health education, and emergency needs assistance all designed to help improve family functioning, parenting, infant well-being, and self-sufficiency in an effort to reduce poor pregnancy outcomes and infant mortality.

## 11. Description and Purpose of Project (Limit Length to Visible area)

The Greater Greenmount Client Service Center is located at 2521 North Charles Street in Marylands 40th Legislative District in Baltimore City. Since opening its doors for clients in 2009, the center has served 9,000 city residents with its continuum of services. In the 2009 legislative session, Baltimore Healthy Start, Inc. was awarded a \$150,000 (of an \$800,000 request) bond bill to acquire and renovate a building to be used as a Client Service Center for its Greater Greenmount service area. Utilizing bank loans, owner held debt, foundation funding, and bond dollars, Healthy Start was able to acquire a building and to do a portion of the necessary upgrades. It is our desire with the request for new bond funding to both complete more of the essential renovations as well as to pay down some of the outstanding debt on the building. Baltimore Healthy Start utilized all of the previous bond bill funding (not received until 2010) on making upgrades to the building. Since then the organization has paid \$252,814 in mortgage expenses from the indirect dollars it received from several major grants and its fundraising efforts. With the ending of two major grants that accounted for 54% of our indirect funds, Healthy Start is now faced with a possible reduction in the number of clients it can serve at a time when demand is at an all time high.

## 28. Comments: (Limit Length to Visible area)

Healthy Start meets clients where they are uniquely utilizing community based outreach, home visiting, and center-based activities to increase client access to services. The Bond Bill request will allow the organization to free-up funds that are currently being used to pay down the mortgage each month to be refocused on sustaining our in-center, client-focused classes and activities that are so critical to this community. Specifically, Healthy Start will continue to operate its full scale direct service center at the Greenmount location where it provides a continuum of services that include: parenting classes relationship counseling family planning entitlement applications early childhood development programs health education life planning and employment counseling breastfeeding and nutrition classes ABE/GED classes adult and early literacy classes transportation, dental services Prenatal and on-going OB/GYN ServicesHealthy Starts success is borne out by the impact the organization has had on participant pregnancy outcomes, most notably in significantly reducing very low birth weight rates. Healthy Start has closed the racial disparities in very low birth weight births for the women it serves, beating or meeting the Surgeon Generals Healthy People 2020 goal of 1.4% (Healthy Start rates were .9% in 2008, 1.4% in 2009, 1.7% in 2010). Our Client Service Centers are at the core of our efforts to maintain connectivity with our vulnerable clients and their families. Other successes included:1. Employs and trains community residents to serve clients needs2. Is certified under Maryland Nonprofit's Standard of Excellence 3. Recently selected as one of CMS' Health Care Innovators Program4. CEO is the incoming President of the National Healthy Start Association 5. Launched an aggressive community advocacy campaign: the Cradle of Hope: Campaign for Healthy Babies to educate and inform Marylanders about infant mortality6. Is one of the original 15 Healthy Start projects operating through the nation 7. In 2011, Baltimore Healthy Start provided services to 1605 clients and had 32, 968 client encounters including nearly 10,000 home visits
