## 10. Description and Purpose of Grantee Organization (Limit Length to Visible area)

Who We Are and What We Do

The Maryland Food Bank was founded in 1979 as the first food bank on the East Coast.

The Maryland Food Bank is a member of Feeding America, the nation's food bank network.

We serve all of Maryland except Prince George's and Montgomery counties, which are served by a sister food bank located in Washington, DC.

We operate a 93,000-square-foot warehouse in Baltimore County and a 13,200-square-foot facility in Wicomico County, which serves the Eastern Shore.

We solicit food donations from manufacturers, growers, retailers, wholesalers and individuals. Food is distributed to the hungry through a network of more than 600 soup kitchens, pantries, shelters and other community-based organizations across the state.

In Fiscal Year 2011, the Maryland Food Bank distributed more than 23.1 million pounds of food - the equivalent of 17.7 million meals.

11. Description and Purpose of Project (Limit Length to Visible area)
This project will provide funding for installation and wiring of a generator, which will insure the safety of food product in the event of power outage like the recent hurricane in 2011 when our power was down for one week. In addition, lighting and electrical systems upgrade will reduce energy costs and through this upgrade it will allow saved dollars towards operating costs.
Replacement of truck bay doors which are more than 40 years old and replacement parts have been discontinued are needed for our warehouse. The new doors will improve safety for warehouse workers and increase efficiency of warehouse operations.
