10. Description and Purpose of Grantee Organization (Limit Length to Visible area)								
The mission of PPPCS is to develop well-educated, community-minded children by providing high-quality, community-based education, capitalizing on the diversity of nearby neighborhoods and using the resources of Patterson Park.  PPPCS serves 621 students and their families in grades pre-K through 8, most of whom come from poor neighborhoods and low income families84% of students in 2010-2011 qualified for free or reduced lunch through the federal lunch program. Demographically, the student body is 70% black, 20% Latino, and 10% white and PPPCS prides itself on the quality of education it provides in an urban setting. ## 11. Description and Purpose of Project (Limit Length to Visible area)

In 2009, PPPCS conceived of a project to upgrade and add to its campus by renovating the original St. Elizabeth Church building which it acquired in 2008, and to build a new middle school building over the existing courtyard.

To that end, the Maryland Health and Higher Education Financing Authority issued Maryland State tax-exempt bonds in the amount of \$13,665,000 that included acquisition of its facilities plus the major renovation and construction. Today, the original church building, built in 1895, now houses the school's cafeteria, gymnasium, library, tech lab and business offices. The middle school building is complete and includes 6 classrooms, an art facility and a state of the art science lab.

Part of the renovation plan was to remove the formstone on the front of the cafeteria building and restore its facade to its appearance in 1895. Unfortunately, when the formstone was removed, PPPCS discovered that lead paint remediation was necessary at a cost that prohibited restoration of the facade. (see item 28 for more information)

Located in the old St. Elizabeth school facilities on Lakewood Avenue, the school sits in the area north of Patterson Park that has recently undergone major neighborhood revitalization. PPPCS is an integral part of that neighborhood's revitalization. The school was started by the local community association-the Patterson Park Neighborhood Association and opened in 2005, providing an alternative to the then-failing public schools in southeast Baltimore. As a consequence, many families stayed in the City who would have otherwise left for the counties.

The families' faith has been rewarded. PPPCS provides an outstanding education for its students as evidenced by a parent satisfaction rate of over 95% and test scores among the best in Baltimore City. Its MSA scores placed it 15th among 130 Baltimore City elementary schools.

That restoration would now be possible with state assistance through this bond bill and with funds from the school. Although the school will continue to seek funding from other sources, its matching funds are available now

This is a very important project. The current facade is an eyesore that detracts from the neighborhood's appeal (this form does not allow us to attach a photograph, but it is a serious eyesore). However, that is only a consequence of improvements brought by formstone removal and subsequent lead paint remediation that was done at a cost of \$130,000. Restoration of the facade would provide a tremendous boost to the school, its stakeholders, and the entire neighborhood.

The project includes the following activities:

- -- Design of interior reconstruction, windows, and frames, and the school's Baltimore St. entrance.
- -- Demolition and removal of existing windows and non-original brick.
- -- Recreation of original openings, including interior spaces.
- -- Installation of new, energy efficient windows.
- -- Restoration of the Baltimore Street entrance.
- -- Mounting two bronze plagues as they would have appeared when the church was built in 1895.
