10. Description and Purpose of Grantee Organization (Limit Length to Visible area) Walker Mill Community Development (WMCDC) is a faith based, human service and developmental 501(c)3,established in 1989 to operate exclusively for charitable and educational purposes in support of schools, providing childcare services, community education, and workforce development serving District 6 & 7 in Capitol Heights, District Heights, Seat Pleasant and Forestville in Prince George's County. As a non-profit organization our mission to build a community that is united for success by education young minds to prepare themselves for economic empowerment. Our vision to alleviate illiteracy,unemployment, poverty, and gang violence by empowering youth with the knowledge, skills and abilities to lessen and/or prevent governmental dependency by 20220. Our purpose is to provide a bridge and pathway for individuals, groups and communities to address and secure the essential life needs through Loving Living and Learning.							

11. Description and Purpose of Project (Limit Length to Visible area)

Funding will be used to complete Phase III (construction, landscaping, purchasing playground equipment) for the 1 story shelter in place measuring 4800 square feet with renewable energy sources to contribute to green elements.Our full-time day care program will be targeted for children ages 2-5 years of age operating between the hours of 6:00 am-6pm; Before & After School Care is available at 6am. to 7:30am.; then 2:00pm -6:00pm. Our goal is to help low-income parents to obtain the child care they need to find and keep jobs as well as prepare young children with the early learning tools to be advanced/proficient as they enter Pre-K. The actual building of this center would mean job creation for construction /concrete,dry walling,painting, truck drivers, carpenters, heavy machinery operators thus helping to reduce the unemployment rate. This facility can be used to accommodate a need forcommunity meetings, seminars, conferences, workshops, tutoring and mentoring programs. Classes for life skills(ice parenting, financial literacy, bridge to life) professional skills and computer skills training will be provided as well as individual and group career counseling, and job placement.
