St. Francis Neighborhood Center (SFNC) is a nonprofit community based organization committed to breaking the cycles of poverty through education, inspiring self-esteem, self-improvement, and strengthening connections to the community. Founded in 1963, the Center serves as a hub of community life for residents to meet, discuss, and improve the quality of life for individuals and the Reservoir Hill community as a whole. The Centers programs work to address complex challenges in an effort to break through the cycles of urban poverty through an approach that builds self-esteem, personal strength, academic, emotional, interpersonal, social, and community development. SFNC strives to give people hope for a better tomorrow by providing them with the tools they need for a better today.

11. Description and Purpose of Project (Limit Length to Visible area)

Because of the tremendous community need and the continued growth of the Centers programs, SFNC is outgrowing its current facility at 2405 Linden Avenue. This project addresses the need for additional space through the construction of a new 4,500 sq. ft. community center on two plots of land at 2407 and 2409 Linden Avenue adjacent to the Centers existing building and a significant renovation of the existing building at 2405 Linden Avenue. Once constructed, the new two-story handicap-accessible building will house on its first floor a large meeting room, an auditorium complete with audio/video equipment, an interfaith space, a modular space suitable yoga or dance classes, and a music room. The second floor of the new structure will provide four classrooms along with modular space to accommodate community meetings of all sizes and an expanded community computer lab. Renovations to the existing building will provide for a community library, conference room, classroom space for arts-education programming, and administrative offices.

28. Comments: (Limit Length to Visible area) St. Francis Neighborhood Center is uniquely positioned to serve Reservoir Hill due to its more than 40-year history of leadership within the community. The Center is active with the more than 20 neighborhood coalitions and countless community organizations and has been the only community organization in Reservoir Hill to expand its programming to meet the growing needs of the community during these times of economic turmoil. In 2009, the Center served more than 4,500 individuals which was a 30% increase from 2008 and saw another 30% increase in the number of people served in 2010. Along with the growth of its existing programs, the Center also continues to develop new programming, services and events in response to ever-evolving needs of the Reservoir Hill community. At this rate of growth, the Center will no longer be able to physically accommodate the growing needs of the community as soon as 2012. Completion of this project will enable the St. Francis Neighborhood Center to: Expand its current programming to serve more people in need. Add new programs, services, and events to address the evolving challenges of neighborhood residents. Provide space to more community organizations to meet and work. Increase productivity by providing enough space for staff and volunteers to work efficiently. Show an investment in Reservoir Hill in the heart of the neighborhood which will invoke a sense of community pride and solidarity.
