Environmental Matters

Vehicle Laws - Stolen Vehicles - Notice

This bill requires a police department to, within three days of taking a vehicle reported stolen into custody, send notice to the last known owner of the vehicle by certified mail, return receipt requested, and by phone if the number is available.

Fiscal Summary

State Effect: General fund expenditures increase negligibly beginning in FY 2013 for the Department of State Police (DSP) to provide the additional forms of notice required by the bill; DSP operations may be more significantly affected by the shortened notice which may also result in additional overtime compensation.

Local Effect: Local law enforcement operations may be significantly affected beginning in FY 2013 to provide additional notice within a shortened timeframe as required by the bill; expenditures increase due to postage and communication costs and may increase for some jurisdictions from overtime payments for existing personnel or to hire additional personnel.

Small Business Effect: Minimal.

Analysis

Current Law: The anti-theft provisions of the Maryland Vehicle Law require that a police officer immediately report reliable information that a vehicle has been stolen to the Motor Vehicle Administration (MVA) and DSP, unless the police officer has received reliable information of the recovery of the vehicle. A police officer must also immediately report reliable information to MVA and DSP regarding the recovery of a vehicle that was previously reported stolen.

MVA must maintain and index cumulative public records of stolen vehicles reported to it. MVA may suspend the registration of a vehicle whose theft is reported to it, and until MVA learns of the recovery of the vehicle or that the report of its theft was erroneous, it may not issue a certificate of title for the vehicle.

Background: According to the Maryland *Uniform Crime Report*, there were 18,024 vehicles reported stolen in 2010, 66% of which were recovered by police. The number of motor vehicle thefts in 2010 was nearly half of the average number of thefts between 2002 and 2004.
