House Bill 244 (Delegate Nathan-Pulliam, *et al.*)
Health and Government Operations

State Government - Commemorative Days - Maryland Centenarians Day

This bill requires the Governor to annually proclaim the second Thursday in May as Maryland Centenarians Day.

Fiscal Summary

State Effect: Commemorating Maryland Centenarians Day does not affect State finances.

Local Effect: None.

Small Business Effect: None.

Analysis

Current Law: Eight official commemorative days and three months are recognized in State law as shown in **Exhibit 1**. The Governor also must issue a proclamation each year encouraging citizens and other individuals to observe a moment of silence at 3 p.m. on Memorial Day to unite in remembrance and commemorate the heroic acts and efforts of Marylanders who have served and died in the U.S. armed forces.

Background: A centenarian is someone who has reached the landmark age of 100 years. Because current average life expectancies around the world are less than 100 years, the term is invariably associated with longevity. According to the U.S. Census Bureau, in 2010, there were approximately 53,400 centenarians living in the United States and 900 living in Maryland.

In 1963 President John F. Kennedy designated May as Senior Citizens Month; in 1980 President Jimmy Carter changed the designation to Older Americans Month. Every president since Kennedy has issued a formal proclamation asking the national to pay tribute to older people in their communities during the month of May.

The Maryland Centenarian Committee, Inc. has held a recognition luncheon on the second Thursday in May for Maryland citizens who have reached or surpassed the landmark age of 100 for the past 19 years.
