## 11. Description and Purpose of Project (Limit Length to Visible area)

Working with a landscape architectural team from Hord / Coplan / Macht, a group of volunteers from the Robert E Lee Park Nature Council developed a concept plan for Acorn Hill, a natural play area for children on the peninsula of Robert E. Lee Park, overlooking Lake Roland. The concept plan envisions using approximately one acre of currently unoccupied space as the site for various play stations with structures for climbing, swinging, exploring and balancing. These stations are designed to help children develop physical skills, using natural materials in an open environment where they can learn while having fun. Along with these stations, Acorn Hill will have picnic and quiet areas, a bird sanctuary, spaces for art projects and a small outdoor theater for productions by and for children.Programs will emphasize environmental considerations and exploration of animal and plant habitats, with talks by park rangers and other suitable experts.

## 28. Comments: (Limit Length to Visible area)

Located just outside the northwest boundary of Baltimore City, the Robert E. Lee Park serves as a regional resource for citizens of both Baltimore City and Baltimore County. Its nearly 450 acres include Lake Roland, a former reservoir for the City, various woodlands, wetlands, serpentine barrens, rare plants and rocky plateaus. In 2009, management of the park passed from Baltimore City to Baltimore County, and after significant improvements, the park reopened in October of 2011. In step with renovations to the park, a group of volunteer citizens established the Robert E Lee Park Nature Council (http://relpnc.org) under the auspices of the Baltimore County Department of Recreation and Parks. As a volunteer, non-profit [status pending] organization, the Nature Council works in cooperation with the County and other entities to maintain, preserve and protect the natural environment and historic structures of Robert E. Lee Park. The Nature Council also aids in identifying elements that enhance enjoyment of the park by all its users. Acorn Hill, a 1-acre site overlooking Lake Roland, will provide a natural play area for children. By doing so, Acorn Hill will ensure that Robert E. Lee Park functions as a destination for the entire family.
