10. Description and Purpose of Grantee Organization (Limit Length to Visible area)

Established in 1863 as an orphanage for victims of the Civil War, The Children's Home is licensed by the Department of Human Resources to serve dependent, neglected, and abused children and youth between the ages of 13 and 21. The organization is a non-profit 501(c)(3), registered as a charitable organization with the Maryland Secretary of State - serving children and youth throughout Maryland. The Children's Home carries out its mission by providing an array of short-and long-term residential and community-based programs on a 44-acre campus. Programs include Regular Group Home Services (co-ed), Transitions High-Intensity Group Home, Diagnostic Center for teen girls, and Successful Starts for youth 16 to 21 years of age. Residents receive 24-hour supervised care, housing, family support, nurturance, treatment planning and guidance. Educational supports are provided for every resident. They attend a community school as well as receive life skills training, plus recreational, cultural, and therapeutic programs. The vision of The Children's Home is - "To be the premier provider of comprehensive child and family development services."

11. Description and Purpose of Project (Limit Length to Visible area)

During the past 10 years, the Children's Home has accomplished major advancements in developing innovative programs and a new facility to better serve a population of youth at risk in Maryland. The next step in development is the construction of two new state-of-the-art residential cottages on The Children's Home campus. The urgency of the construction program is due to the condition and design of older buildings on campus. The cottages of the 1920's lack the safety, flexibility, energy efficiency, and privacy features that are important for the residents of the Home. A replacement building for a fire-damaged residential cottage, was designed and is scheduled for construction this spring, funded via insurance monies. Through negotiations and recommendations of the builder, The Children's Home will build two cottages simultaneously that will yield greater construction efficiency and result in net cost savings. This will follow the Master Plan of the Home - to create housing that is energy efficient, safe, ADA compliant, and easier to monitor for therapeutic treatment. This new facility has tremendous potential in helping serve populations with a design that emphasizes flexibility. The one-story design is 4,000 square feet with 10 private bedrooms, common area, staff offices, laundry, bathrooms, and study areas.
