10 Description and Purpose of Grantee Organization (Limit Length to Visible area)								

For over 75 years, Easter Seals has developed a wide range of programs to serve Maryland. EasterSeals has built a strong reputation of effective collaborations with local neighborhood leaders todesign and offer the best possible supportive services for individuals with disabilities and their caregivers. Operating from nineteen sites spread across Maryland, Northern Virginia, and the D.C., Easter Seals provides best practice programs across the life span continuum to all of ourclients, including veterans and their families. Easter Seals provides community-based services in the following core program areas:1) support for wounded warriors, veterans and their families 2) senior medical day services for adults with disabilities 3) inclusive early intervention/education forchildren with disabilities and typically developing children (many of whom have another specialneed such as risk of delays due to low family income) 4) family caregiver respite services and 5) employment programs through specialized evaluation, training, support and job placement. Additional services include home/community-base assistive technology; rehabilitative services; community education; and advocacy for adults and children with disabilities and their families.

11. Description and Purpose of Project (Limit Length to Visible area)

The proposed renovation of the second and third floors would provide increased space for our evergrowing inclusive early childhood education programs and our military programs which includeserving post 9/11 wounded warriors, their children and families, employment services for veterans,and caregiver training. The expansion would allow for over 500 individuals and their families to beserved each year. The relocation of our administrative offices to the 3rd floor would allow for morespace for our growing staff and provide the much needed area for our expanding Military and Veterans Programs. The scope of the project would be the following:2nd Floor Inclusive Child Care: Inclusive early education program for children 6 weeks to 6 years,Summer camp for children ages 6 to 8, Full-time day care, Therapy services, Community trainingprograms (CDA/CPR), Internships for area colleges and universities, and Professional trainingseminars for metro D.C. early education and therapy professionals.3rd Floor Administration: Headquarters for Easter Seals Staff, Military and Veterans Staff andProgram Space, Conference and training rooms, and Close proximity to Metro.

28. Comments: (Limit Length to Visible area)

Easter Seals has partnered with Montgomery County (MoCo) to implement an innovative projectthat was initially created to address the growing crisis of inadequate senior day care for those withdisabilities considered "at risk" because of income level or health coverage status. Family caregivers - numbering nearly 1 in 4 - need high-quality, reliable day services near their place of employment. MoCo's initial support was the contribution of a \$1.2M parcel of land located at 1420Spring Street (in exchange, ES has agreed to subsidize \$1.2M in care for at-risk seniors over thenext two decades). The SS location also makes the IGC ideally situated for the estimated 17,000commuters from Baltimore and elsewhere in the region who travel to and from work along the Washington-Baltimore corridor. The Inter-Generational Center (IGC) is the only intergenerational center in close proximity to then ation's capital and will draw positive attention to Maryland. It will serve to set the bar high for thefuture of disability care across the country and is a model that pairs program efficiencies and conomies of scale with respect for the enormous benefits of intergenerational communication. Amajor private donor to this project spoke at a gathering saying, "When we look for a place to investour corporate contributions, we have to be prudent and treat our contributions the same way we treatour operating funds and ask the hard question, 'Where can we get the best return on investment?'When I tour the Easter Seals facilities, talk to the clients and think about the direction that thisorganization is headed, I am constantly reminded that the return on investment - in terms of humanlives and economic feasibility - is outstanding." Autism ... Alzheimer's Disease ... Downssyndrome ... stroke impairments ... hearing or vision loss ... the tragic result of an accident ... it doesn't matter to Easter Seals why a client is disabled ... what matters is that we work around it to together create a life of dignity and worth. It is Easter Seals' long history of combining human services and conservative operation that will ensure that the State of Maryland receives a very high "return on investment" for its citizens with disabilities when supporting this request for the Easter Seals Inter-Generational Center. A true public/private enterprise, the IGC has received support from individuals, corporations and foundations, as well as from county, state, and federal partnerships. We have forged strong working collaborations for program development, with among others: MD DOE, DORS; MoCo Office on Aging and Disability Services; MoCo Intergenerational Committee: MoCo Infants and ToddlerProgram: MoCo Public Schools: Alzheimer's Association; Generations United; and Johns HopkinsUniversity. As we near the completion of the capital campaign, we respectfully seek approval of this bond bill request to allow us to move from capital concerns to programming.
