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HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

1 A House Joint Resolution concerning

Ongoing Conflict in the Democratic Republic of the Congo

FOR the purpose of asserting that certain leaders and the international community need to break the cycle of violence in the Democratic Republic of the Congo and the surrounding region; urging that certain action be taken by certain persons to address certain issues in the Democratic Republic of the Congo; acknowledging the work of a certain individual and certain organizations; providing that a copy of this resolution be forwarded by the Department of Legislative Services to certain individuals; and generally relating to the ongoing conflict in the Democratic Republic of the Congo.

WHEREAS, Since the 1990s, an estimated 5,000,000 people have died and more than 2,000,000 people have been displaced due to repeated cycles of conflict and atrocities committed in the Democratic Republic of the Congo, particularly in North and South Kivu provinces; and

WHEREAS, The United States Department of State, the United Nations, and humanitarian organizations have documented staggering rates of sexual and gender—based violence resulting in tens of thousands of cases perpetrated by the army and armed groups in the Democratic Republic of the Congo; and

WHEREAS, The natural mineral wealth in the Democratic Republic of the Congo, including the discovery of oil, has been a key driver to insurrection, violence, and exploitation; and

WHEREAS, The deeply flawed November 2011 elections in the Democratic Republic of the Congo laid bare significant political, economic, and social challenges; and

WHEREAS, The Democratic Republic of the Congo is home to one of the world's longest enduring and most expensive international peacekeeping operations; and



WHEREAS, The November 20, 2012, seizure of the city of Goma by the M23 rebel group, despite bilateral and multilateral efforts to address longstanding humanitarian crises, forge lasting peace, and pursue security sector reform and accountability, demonstrated that the underlying causes of the recurring conflicts in the Democratic Republic of the Congo and eastern provinces remain unresolved; and

WHEREAS, On November 15, 2012, the United Nations Group of Experts provided compelling evidence that the current crisis is fueled and exacerbated by direct and indirect engagement by the Government of Rwanda, including evidence of significant military and logistical support, as well as operational and political guidance, to the M23 rebel group; and

WHEREAS, The United Nations and the United States have imposed sanctions on the M23 rebel group and its leaders for human rights atrocities, including rape, massacres, and the recruitment and physical and psychological torture of child soldiers; and

WHEREAS, It is imperative to provide critical, life—saving humanitarian aid, particularly to displaced people and conflict—affected communities; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND, That the General Assembly:

- (1) asserts that the time has come for the region's leaders and the international community to break the cycle of violence and impunity in the Democratic Republic of the Congo and the surrounding region and address the underlying root causes of this and previous crises;
- (2) calls on the governments of the Great Lakes region in Africa to respect the national security and territorial integrity of the Democratic Republic of the Congo and to immediately halt and prevent any and all forms of support, including support provided by individuals, to Congolese nonstate armed groups;
 - (3) recognizes the recent efforts of the government of the Democratic Republic of the Congo to end the recruitment of children into the armed forces by demanding an immediate cessation to the recruitment and exploitation of children by militias, and calling on all armed groups to free civilians, including children, held against their will;
 - (4) calls on President Obama and his administration, in close coordination with international and regional partners, to mobilize a comprehensive response to prevent further deterioration of peace and stability in the Democratic Republic of the Congo;
- (5) acknowledges the work of the existing Special Advisor to the Great Lakes and the Democratic Republic of the Congo;

- 1 (6) requests the addition of a United States Presidential Envoy 2 position to secure an immediate and permanent end to hostilities and to maintain 3 humanitarian assistance to those in need in the Democratic Republic of the Congo;
- 4 (7) calls on President Obama and his administration to fully investigate and make actionable recommendations to address and prevent heinous crimes in the Democratic Republic of the Congo, including fully implementing sanctions outlined in § 1246 of the federal National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2013;
- 9 (8) urges the government of the Democratic Republic of the Congo, 10 with close support from the international community, to investigate and prosecute 11 those who have committed war crimes, crimes against humanity, grave violations of 12 children's rights, and other serious human rights violations; and

(9) calls on the government of the Democratic Republic of the Congo to meaningfully engage in security sector reforms that will prevent militia combatants accused of abuses, particularly the M23 rebel group, from integrating into the military, in addition to hosting an internal dialogue to address critical internal political issues and strengthen its work toward state institution building; and be it further
