A BILL ENTITLED

1 AN ACT concerning

2 **Task Force to Study How to Improve Student Achievement in Middle School**

3 FOR the purpose of establishing the Task Force to Study How to Improve Student
4 Achievement in Middle School; providing for the composition, chair, and staffing
5 of the Task Force; prohibiting a member of the Task Force from receiving
6 certain compensation, but authorizing the reimbursement of certain expenses;
7 requiring the Task Force to study a certain report and make recommendations
8 regarding certain matters; requiring the Task Force to report its findings and
9 recommendations to the Governor and the General Assembly on or before a
10 certain date; providing for the termination of this Act; and generally relating to
11 the Task Force to Study How to Improve Student Achievement in Middle
12 School.

13 Preamble

14 WHEREAS, In 2011, the Southern Regional Education Board's (SREB) Middle
15 Grades Commission published a comprehensive report titled, "A New Mission for the
16 Middle Grades"; and

17 WHEREAS, The SREB report focuses on the mission to build a strong
18 foundation to prepare students for success in high school, so that more students will
19 graduate from high school and proceed to college or technical training; and

20 WHEREAS, The SREB report suggests that students should begin to make a
21 connection between their learning experiences in middle school and their pathway
22 through high school to college, technical training, or a career; and

23 WHEREAS, Research further indicates students and parents are underexposed
24 to the opportunities available through career and technical education; and

1 WHEREAS, The earlier in a student's academic career that the student begins
2 considering career goals, the easier it is to motivate the student and connect academic
3 subjects and lessons to real life applications; now, therefore,

4 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF
5 MARYLAND, That:

6 (a) There is a Task Force to Study How to Improve Student Achievement in
7 Middle School.

8 (b) The Task Force consists of the following members:

9 (1) one member of the Senate of Maryland, appointed by the President
10 of the Senate;

11 (2) one member of the House of Delegates, appointed by the Speaker of
12 the House;

13 (3) the Assistant State Superintendent for Career and College
14 Readiness in the State Department of Education, or the Assistant State
15 Superintendent's designee;

16 (4) the Secretary of Higher Education, or the Secretary's designee;

17 (5) the Assistant Secretary for the Division of Workforce Development
18 and Adult Learning in the Department of Labor, Licensing, and Regulation, or the
19 Assistant Secretary's designee; and

20 (6) the following members, appointed by the Governor:

21 (i) one representative of the State Board of Education;

22 (ii) one representative of the Maryland Association of Boards of
23 Education;

24 (iii) one representative of the Public School Superintendents
25 Association of Maryland;

26 (iv) one representative of the Maryland State Education
27 Association;

28 (v) one member who is a principal of a public middle school in
29 the State; and

30 (vi) two members who are middle school teachers in public
31 schools in the State, one of whom shall be a science, technology, engineering, or
32 mathematics teacher.

1 (c) The Governor shall designate the chair of the Task Force.

2 (d) The State Department of Education shall provide staff for the Task Force.

3 (e) A member of the Task Force:

4 (1) may not receive compensation as a member of the Task Force; but

5 (2) is entitled to reimbursement for expenses under the Standard
6 State Travel Regulations, as provided in the State budget.

7 (f) The Task Force shall:

8 (1) study and analyze the findings and recommendations set forth in
9 SREB's "A New Mission for the Middle Grades" report;

10 (2) consider whether the findings and recommendations set forth in
11 the SREB report would be feasible and appropriate to implement in the State;

12 (3) if the Task Force concludes that the findings and recommendations
13 set forth in the SREB report would be feasible and appropriate to implement in the
14 State, develop a Collaborative Action Plan to create a statewide framework for
15 redesigning the middle school experience for students in grades 6 through 8;

16 (4) make recommendations on legislation and policy initiatives to
17 address the educational needs of middle school students; and

18 (5) make recommendations on any other relevant issues or
19 considerations identified by the Task Force.

20 (g) On or before December 1, 2014, the Task Force shall report its findings
21 and recommendations to the Governor and, in accordance with § 2-1246 of the State
22 Government Article, the General Assembly.

23 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect
24 July 1, 2014. It shall remain effective for a period of 1 year and, at the end of June 30,
25 2015, with no further action required by the General Assembly, this Act shall be
26 abrogated and of no further force and effect.
