21 22 23	WHEREAS, Oral health is a critical component of overall health affecting speech, nutrition, social development, employability and productivity, and quality of life; and

1 2 3	WHEREAS, Students nationwide miss more than 52 million hours of school and employed adults lose more than 164 million hours of work each year due to dental disease; and
4 5	WHEREAS, Dental decay is one of the most prevalent health problems in Maryland, with 31% of third grade children having experienced dental decay; and
6 7	WHEREAS, Greater access to dental care is associated with higher utilization of preventive and restorative dental services; and
8 9	WHEREAS, Preventive treatments, including fluoride and sealants, are proven to reduce the risk of dental decay in school–age children; and
10 11	WHEREAS, Low-income children suffer more tooth decay than their more affluent peers; and
12 13	WHEREAS, 30% of postpartum women reported that it had been between 1 and 5 years since their last teeth cleaning; and
14 15	WHEREAS, Maryland residents deserve access to high-quality oral health care; now, therefore,
