SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION

3 4 5 6	FOR the purpose of formally requesting the Maryland Human Trafficking Task Force to perform a certain study and provide a certain recommendation by a certain date; providing for the distribution of copies of this Resolution; and generally relating to human trafficking.
7 8 9	WHEREAS, The State of Maryland affirms a commitment to respecting the dignity and internationally recognized right of all people to live a life free from violence and coercion; and
10 11	WHEREAS, Human trafficking is an intolerable and gross violation of human rights; and
12 13 14 15	WHEREAS, Human trafficking is a criminal activity in which human beings are treated as possessions to be controlled and exploited through the use of force, threats of force, deception, or coercion for the purpose of involuntary subjection to commercial sex acts, forced labor, bonded labor, and other forms of servitude; and
16 17	WHEREAS, The form of slavery known as human trafficking knows no borders and preys on victims of any age, race, gender, or nationality; and
18 19 20 21	WHEREAS, Human trafficking preys on the poor and most vulnerable members of a society who are disproportionately affected by poverty, race, gender inequities, inadequate education, and a lack of economically viable employment, thereby fueling human trafficking; and
22 23 24	WHEREAS, The State of Maryland recognizes that certain groups are particularly vulnerable to the crime of human trafficking in the United States and Maryland, especially women and young children, the overwhelming majority of whom



WHEREAS, Approximately 1.2 million children are trafficked every year, with two children sold into slavery every minute, and an estimated 100,000 bought and sold in the United States alone; and

WHEREAS, The irresponsible and highly profitable sexualization of children through various media is promulgated in cultures around the world, thus normalizing the sexual objectification of youth and perpetuating demand for sexual contact with underage victims; and

WHEREAS, The vast majority of state human trafficking laws do not provide comprehensive protective responses for exploited youth, victim assistance, remedies, or protection from arrest based on offenses committed as a result of being victimized; and

WHEREAS, The State of Maryland affirms the important work of persons in law enforcement, education, medicine, counseling, and other professions who address human trafficking through their assigned responsibilities; and

WHEREAS, The State of Maryland affirms the unique vulnerability of minors to the crime of human trafficking and the importance of working to restore minors who have been victimized and condemned to the heartbreaking and humiliating life of human trafficking; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND, That the General Assembly formally requests the Maryland Human Trafficking Task Force to perform a comprehensive study of the various approaches other states have implemented while decriminalizing the act of prostitution by minors caught in human trafficking as defined in federal law and providing a complementary restorative program to facilitate the successful reintroduction of those minors back into society; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the General Assembly formally requests the Maryland Human Trafficking Task Force to provide a detailed recommendation of best possible approaches and programs based on the results of their study to the Governor and, in accordance with § 2–1246 of the State Government Article, the Senate Judicial Proceedings Committee and the House Judiciary Committee on or before December 31, 2014; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a copy of this Resolution be forwarded by the Department of Legislative Services to the Honorable Martin O'Malley, Governor of Maryland; the Honorable Thomas V. Mike Miller, Jr., President of the Senate of Maryland; and the Honorable Michael E. Busch, Speaker of the House of Delegates.
