3 4 5	WHEREAS, The Vietnam War was fought in Vietnam from 1961 to 1975, and involved North Vietnam and the Viet Cong in conflict with United States armed forces, allies of the United States, and South Vietnam; and
6 7	WHEREAS, In 1965, more than 129,000 members of the United States armed forces were serving in Vietnam, reaching a peak of approximately 543,000 by 1969; and
8 9 10	WHEREAS, On January 27, 1973, an agreement was reached to end the war and, on March 30, 1973, the United States armed forces completed its withdrawal of combat troops; and
11 12 13	WHEREAS, More than 58,000 members of the United States armed forces, including 1,014 from the State of Maryland, lost their lives in Vietnam and more than 300,000 members were wounded; and
14 15 16 17 18	WHEREAS, Members of the United States armed forces who served bravely and faithfully for the United States during the Vietnam War were caught on their return home in the crossfire of an extremely divisive public debate about the involvement of the United States in the Vietnam War, which deprived many of those members of public support and appreciation of their patriotic service; and
19 20 21	WHEREAS, In 1982, the Vietnam Veterans Memorial was dedicated in the District of Columbia to commemorate those members of the United States armed forces who died or were declared missing—in—action in the Vietnam War; and
22 23 24	WHEREAS, The designation of a "Welcome Home Vietnam Veterans Day" is an appropriate way for the State to thank and honor its members of the United States armed forces for their service and sacrifice during the Vietnam War; now, therefore,
25 26 27 28	SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND, That Section(s) 7–402 through 7–413, respectively, of Article – General Provisions of the Annotated Code of Maryland be renumbered to be Section(s) 7–403 through 7–414, respectively.

AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act is an emergency measure, is necessary for the immediate preservation of the public health or safety, has been passed by a yea and nay vote supported by three—fifths of all the members elected to each of the two Houses of the General Assembly, and shall take effect from the date it is enacted.
