A BILL ENTITLED

1 AN ACT concerning

2 Commission on the Solemn Remembrance of the Victims of Lynching

3 FOR the purpose of establishing the Commission on the Solemn Remembrance of the 4 Victims of Lynching; providing for the composition, chair, and staffing of the $\mathbf{5}$ Commission; prohibiting a member of the Commission from receiving certain 6 compensation, but authorizing the reimbursement of certain expenses; requiring the 7 Commission to study and make recommendations regarding certain matters; 8 requiring the Commission to report its findings and recommendations to the 9 Governor and the General Assembly on or before a certain date; providing for the 10 termination of this Act; and generally relating to the Commission on the Solemn 11 Remembrance of the Victims of Lynching.

Preamble

WHEREAS, Various archival sources have identified numerous racially motivated lynchings throughout the State in the 19th and 20th centuries where individuals were accused of a crime and in some cases arrested and jailed; but mob rule intervened and they were murdered before due process took its course; and

WHEREAS, The 1933 lynching of George Armwood in the small town of Princess
Anne was the catalyst for the future careers of two of this State's leading civil rights
leaders, Clarence Mitchell, Jr., and his younger brother, Parren Mitchell; and

WHEREAS, There are no public memorials or historical markers in the State remembering the numerous victims of lynchings that occurred in this State; and

WHEREAS, Recent events underscore the urgent need for a fuller understanding of the African American experience and to place current challenges in a wider context; now, therefore,

4 (g) On or before December 1, 2016, the Commission shall report its findings and 5 recommendations to the Governor and, in accordance with § 2–1246 of the State 6 Government Article, the General Assembly.

SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect June
1, 2016. It shall remain effective for a period of 1 year and 1 month and, at the end of June
30, 2017, with no further action required by the General Assembly, this Act shall be
abrogated and of no further force and effect.
