A BILL ENTITLED

1 AN ACT concerning

2 Criminal Procedure – Expungement – Identity Theft

- FOR the purpose of authorizing a person who was convicted of a crime to file a petition for
 expungement if the person has a certain identity theft passport; authorizing a court
 to grant a petition for expungement at any time if the person presents an identity
 theft passport under certain circumstances; and generally relating to expungement.

SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

Article – Criminal Procedure

15 10–105.

16 (a) A person who has been charged with the commission of a crime, including a 17 violation of the Transportation Article for which a term of imprisonment may be imposed, 18 or who has been charged with a civil offense or infraction, except a juvenile offense, as a 19 substitute for a criminal charge may file a petition listing relevant facts for expungement 20 of a police record, court record, or other record maintained by the State or a political 21 subdivision of the State if:

- 22
- (1) the person is acquitted;
- 23 (2) the charge is otherwise dismissed;

1 (3) a probation before judgment is entered, unless the person is charged 2 with a violation of § 21–902 of the Transportation Article or Title 2, Subtitle 5 or § 3–211 3 of the Criminal Law Article;

4 (4) a nolle prosequi or nolle prosequi with the requirement of drug or 5 alcohol treatment is entered;

6 (5) the court indefinitely postpones trial of a criminal charge by marking 7 the criminal charge "stet" or stet with the requirement of drug or alcohol abuse treatment 8 on the docket;

9 (6) the case is compromised under § 3–207 of the Criminal Law Article;

10 (7) the charge was transferred to the juvenile court under § 4–202 of this 11 article;

12 (8) the person:

13 (i) is convicted of only one criminal act, and that act is not a crime14 of violence; and

15 (ii) is granted a full and unconditional pardon by the Governor;

(9) the person was convicted of a crime or found not criminally responsibleunder any State or local law that prohibits:

- 18 (i) urination or defecation in a public place;
- 19 (ii) panhandling or soliciting money;
- 20 (iii) drinking an alcoholic beverage in a public place;
- 21 (iv) obstructing the free passage of another in a public place or a 22 public conveyance;
- 23 (v) sleeping on or in park structures, such as benches or doorways;
- 24 (vi) loitering;
- 25 (vii) vagrancy;

26 (viii) riding a transit vehicle without paying the applicable fare or 27 exhibiting proof of payment; or

(ix) except for carrying or possessing an explosive, acid, concealed
weapon, or other dangerous article as provided in § 7–705(b)(6) of the Transportation
Article, any of the acts specified in § 7–705 of the Transportation Article;

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1 (10) the person was found not criminally responsible under any State or 2 local law that prohibits misdemeanor:

- 3 (i) trespass;
- 4 (ii) disturbing the peace; or
- 5 (iii) telephone misuse; [or]

6 (11) the person was convicted of a crime and the act on which the conviction 7 was based is no longer a crime; **OR**

8 (12) THE PERSON WAS CONVICTED OF A CRIME, BUT HAS AN IDENTITY 9 THEFT PASSPORT ISSUED UNDER § 8–305 OF THE CRIMINAL LAW ARTICLE 10 INDICATING THAT THE CRIME WAS ACTUALLY COMMITTED BY ANOTHER USING THE 11 PERSON'S PERSONAL IDENTIFYING INFORMATION.

12 (a-1) A person's attorney or personal representative may file a petition, on behalf of 13 the person, for expungement under this section if the person died before disposition of the 14 charge by nolle prosequi or dismissal.

15 (b) (1) Except as provided in paragraphs (2) and (3) of this subsection, a person 16 shall file a petition in the court in which the proceeding began.

17 (2) (i) Except as provided in subparagraph (ii) of this paragraph, if the 18 proceeding began in one court and was transferred to another court, the person shall file 19 the petition in the court to which the proceeding was transferred.

(ii) If the proceeding began in one court and was transferred to the
juvenile court under § 4–202 or § 4–202.2 of this article, the person shall file the petition in
the court of original jurisdiction from which the order of transfer was entered.

(3) (i) If the proceeding in a court of original jurisdiction was appealed
 to a court exercising appellate jurisdiction, the person shall file the petition in the appellate
 court.

26 (ii) The appellate court may remand the matter to the court of 27 original jurisdiction.

(c) (1) Except as provided in paragraph (2) of this subsection, a petition for expungement based on an acquittal, a nolle prosequi, or a dismissal may not be filed within 30 3 years after the disposition, unless the petitioner files with the petition a written general 31 waiver and release of all the petitioner's tort claims arising from the charge.

1 (2) A petition for expungement based on a probation before judgment or a 2 stet with the requirement of drug or alcohol abuse treatment may not be filed earlier than 3 the later of:

4 (i) the date the petitioner was discharged from probation or the 5 requirements of obtaining drug or alcohol abuse treatment were completed; or

6 (ii) 3 years after the probation was granted or stet with the 7 requirement of drug or alcohol abuse treatment was entered on the docket.

8 (3) A petition for expungement based on a nolle prosequi with the 9 requirement of drug or alcohol treatment may not be filed until the completion of the 10 required treatment.

11 (4) A petition for expungement based on a full and unconditional pardon 12 by the Governor may not be filed later than 10 years after the pardon was signed by the 13 Governor.

14 (5) Except as provided in paragraph (2) of this subsection, a petition for 15 expungement based on a stet or a compromise under § 3–207 of the Criminal Law Article 16 may not be filed within 3 years after the stet or compromise.

17 (6) A petition for expungement based on the conviction of a crime under 18 subsection (a)(9) of this section may not be filed within 3 years after the conviction or 19 satisfactory completion of the sentence, including probation, that was imposed for the 20 conviction, whichever is later.

(7) A petition for expungement based on a finding of not criminally
responsible under subsection (a)(9) or (10) of this section may not be filed within 3 years
after the finding of not criminally responsible was made by the court.

24 (8) A court may grant a petition for expungement at any time on a showing
25 of good cause OR IF THE PERSON PRESENTS AN IDENTITY THEFT PASSPORT UNDER
26 SUBSECTION (A)(12) OF THIS SECTION.

27 (d) (1) The court shall have a copy of a petition for expungement served on the28 State's Attorney.

29 (2) Unless the State's Attorney files an objection to the petition for 30 expungement within 30 days after the petition is served, the court shall pass an order 31 requiring the expungement of all police records and court records about the charge.

32 (e) (1) If the State's Attorney files a timely objection to the petition, the court 33 shall hold a hearing.

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1 (2) If the court at the hearing finds that the person is entitled to 2 expungement, the court shall order the expungement of all police records and court records 3 about the charge.

4 (3) If the court finds that the person is not entitled to expungement, the 5 court shall deny the petition.

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(4) The person is not entitled to expungement if:

7 (i) the petition is based on the entry of probation before judgment, 8 except a probation before judgment for a crime where the act on which the conviction is 9 based is no longer a crime, and the person within 3 years of the entry of the probation before 10 judgment has been convicted of a crime other than a minor traffic violation or a crime where 11 the act on which the conviction is based is no longer a crime; or

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(ii) the person is a defendant in a pending criminal proceeding.

13 (f) Unless an order is stayed pending an appeal, within 60 days after entry of the 14 order, every custodian of the police records and court records that are subject to the order 15 of expungement shall advise in writing the court and the person who is seeking 16 expungement of compliance with the order.

17 (g) (1) The State's Attorney is a party to the proceeding.

18 (2) A party aggrieved by the decision of the court is entitled to appellate 19 review as provided in the Courts Article.

20 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect 21 October 1, 2016.
